EVOLUTION AND BOOZE PARTIES ROUSE NEWBERG

Newberg, Or., June 1.—Strife over the teaching of evolution has broken out in Newberg. This quiet city of 2000 inhabitants and 22 churches, aroused last week by a wine party of high school seniors, was today shaken by reports of another party in the parlors of the newly elected principal of the public schools.

Three teachers whose salaries were recently increased by the school board have resigned, it was said, in protest against the modernistic tendencies of the new members of the school staff.

Retention of M. Reid Hanger, high school teacher who was chairman on which there was said to have been drinking, and the retention of James W. Hamilton as principal and superintendent were the grounds of discussion.

Mr. Hamilton has admitted that he believes in evolution, according to friends. He could not be located here today.

Miss Verdie Anderson and Miss Mildred Ferguson, high school teachers, and Miss Marie Marver, grade school teacher, have turned in their resignations.

C. C. Ferguson, chief of police of Newberg and father of Miss Ferguson, was credited with saying that no daughter of his could teach school when the principal believed in evolution and smoked cigarettes.

Members of various organizations, including the Women's Christian Temperance union, were said to have protested against the modernistic tendencies of the teachers about a month ago.

A meeting was held at which the plight of the schools was discussed. With the drinking affair, in which five boys of prominent families were supposed to have been involved, and the election of an alleged modernist to the principal ship, discussion has suddenly become spirited.

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COMMENCEMENT AT CHEMAWA ON

Chemawa, Or., June 1.—Commencement at Chemawa started in the fall evening yesterday afternoon with the competitive military drill held on the campus. A large crowd attended the opening event. This evening the annual opera will be presented for the first night for the public. Last year the auditorium was crowded to capacity for both evenings and is expected to be as well attended as last.

"Paul Revere" is being presented this year and it promises to be the best yet given. Tomorrow evening the program will be repeated. The play deals with the Revolutionary war with a clever love role worked in. They play will start at 8 o'clock for both evenings.

Wednesday afternoon the regular routine program will be given with recitations and classes participating. There will be no graduating class this year due to the action of the government which is enlarging the classes from the tenth grade and allowing a full high school course. The students have been attending the Salem high school.

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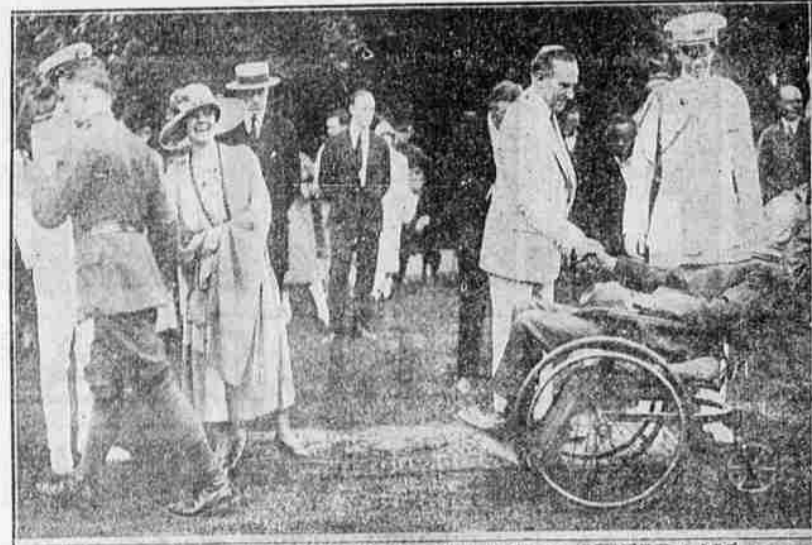
CAR TURNS OVER NEAR RICKREALL; TWO HURT
