Mrs. Karl Kugel will be hostess to a meeting of the Sweet Briar club in her home tomorrow.

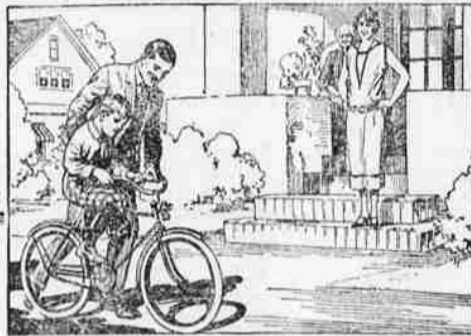
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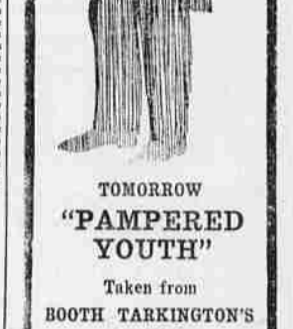
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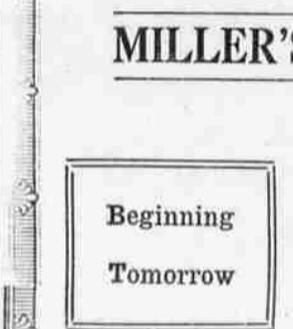


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
