**FOREIGNERS IN SHANGHAI FIX FOR WAR**

but only petty outbreaks were reported.

Sharp distinctions were emphasized by Chinese in favoring American firms and homes, although all foreigners were disfavored, particularly the British and Japanese. These Chinese shops doing business refused the patronage of British customers while customers while favoring Americans.

**Combine Households.** Mrs. Milton Purdy, wife of a judge of the United States court here and the wife of Counsel General Cunningham combined household forces for the emergency today when the servants in their respective homes left.

Many of the Chinese servants remain loyal however. Some old servants have remained with their masters despite death threats instilled by their families' quarantined in Chinese territory. The threats have been voiced directly by student canvassers.

These foreign firms, hotels and institutions which continue to function are doing so through the aid of volunteer foreign women workers who have stepped into the places left by the strikers.

It became known today that a turbulent faction in the Chinese student ranks, was striving to effect another conflagration by urging the constabulary in Chinese territory to become an armed force supporting the anti-foreign movement.

An unconfirmed report says this element is striving to induce General Chiang-fang to move his troops from Hangchow to Shanghai.

Foreign forces patrolling Shanghai streets flanked by hoarded stores fronts today were confronted with posters reading: "Assassinate foreign police" and "Assassinate foreigners connected with law courts."

Among the documents seized by police in raids on Shanghai university was a letter from a Chinese in Berlin to a professor at the college, saying: "It has been decided that students of three countries—China, Germany and Russia—will start an organization of which will unite the nations of the world in the cause of the revolution of the party."

The letter was signed "Su Han-kan, Yahu Kant street 22, Berlin," and was mailed from Charlottenburg, April 5 and received here on May 15 by Professor Klaus Seung.

The letter reveals efforts of Chinese in other countries to make the Kuomintang—the Chinese party which is charged with responsibility for inciting the present trouble—an international organization with branches in Germany, Russia and France.

**PORTLAND OFFICERS SEEKING MISSING MAN**

Portland, Or., June 5.—The sheriff's office is endeavoring to solve the mystery of the disappearance of Ralph Waldo Elden, former owner of an advertising and loan office in Portland.

Elden disappeared Wednesday night and was last seen wandering in the brush in the Dunthorpe neighborhood near Elk Rock.

Last night his relatives searching in that neighborhood found his car and his hat and coat and turned them over to the constable in Oswego, Clackamas county. Deputy Sheriff Lee Mollenhour was unable to find any trace of the man at the scene today.

Elden's family said that he had been brooding over financial reverses lately.

## MARINES ARE TO PATROL GROUNDS AT SWAMPSCOTT

Washington, June 5.—A carefully picked detachment of marines will aid secret service men in guarding President Coolidge during his vacation stay at Swampscott, Mass.

Plans now being worked out call for the use of some of the marines doing duty with the Mayflower, the president's yacht, which will be anchored at Marblehead, near the summer white house for an additional detail made up of men who have distinguished war records or have served at American embassies or legations abroad.

White Court, the establishment on the coast which has been placed at the disposal of President and Mrs. Coolidge by their friend, Frank B. Stearns, is situated on a neck of land in close proximity to half a dozen other summer homes.

There is no fence around this tract, and in addition to the one road entrance which will be guarded, there are half a dozen or more trails and a quarter of a mile to be watched if the president is to have seclusion.

Funds are not available to transfer any of the white house guards to Swampscott for summer duty, and it has been decided to provide marines to assume part of the guard duty here by them and secret service men.

Four or more posts will be established to provide protection on all sides of White Court. The marines will wear khaki and will carry side arms only. A mess will be established near the president's house for the day's guard but those off duty will be quartered and fed at some distance from White Court, probably in tents.

## MILES ELECTED TO HEAD LIONS

Russ Miles was elected president of the Salem Lions club at the regular meeting of the club this noon. He succeeds W. W. Rossburgh, retiring president. Miles is a charter member of the local organization, is head of the Oregon Gravel company, and is associated with his father, R. C. Miles, in the new linen mill project in Salem. Other officers elected this noon were as follows:

First vice-president, Robert Allen; second vice-president, Dr. H. M. Brown; third vice-president, Dr. C. L. George; secretary, H. R. White; treasurer, John Orr; directors, Louis Ledford and E. B. Grabenhorst.

All elections were unanimous except for the offices of secretary and positions on the board of directors. Merrill Ohling and Carl Greig, both of whom were put up for the office of president, withdrew in favor of Miles.

Installation will take place at an early meeting of the club.

## BRITISH EVACUATION NOW UP TO GERMANY

London, June 5.—(A.P.)—It was authoritatively indicated today that the British have no intention of evacuating the Cologne occupied territory until Germany fulfills the disarmament requirements of the Versailles treaty. The inter-allied note to Germany to be made public tomorrow, contains a statement to that effect which is indicated.

## EDUCATOR SAYS NORTHWEST ON EVE OF NEW ERA

The northwest is on the threshold of a period of development greater than any experienced by any other part of the country, was the statement advanced by Joe McLaughlin, superintendent of schools at Corvallis, speaking before the Salem Lions club at their luncheon at the Marlion hotel this noon.

The subject of his speech was, "The Old and the New." He based his statement on a study of conditions here as compared to other parts of the United States.

Modern inventions, including the airplane, telephone and radio, came in for a good share of Mr. McLaughlin's attention. The time is not far distant, he claimed, when it will be possible to get up in the morning at Portland, drink a cup of coffee, and drop down to San Francisco to eat breakfast.

At present a business man in England is able to fly to France, Germany or Spain in the forenoon, transact his business there and return in time to spend the evening with his family, the speaker stated. He declared that there have been greater changes in the world during the past 25 years than in the previous 25,000.

Pittsburgh, Pa., June 5.—The heat wave, which continued unabated early today, with no prospect of relief, is held directly or indirectly accountable for 11 deaths and an uncounted number of prostrations in this district. Seven deaths have been reported in the last 24 hours.

While the temperature stood at 95, John Carley, 81, played 36 holes of golf in tournament competition and suffered no ill effects.

**Temperature Mounts**  
Philadelphia, June 5.—(A.P.)—Five deaths from heat were reported here today, making a total of eleven since the torrid wave struck Philadelphia Monday. All public schools were closed at noon. At 3 p. m. the weather bureau thermometer registered 99.

**Baltimore, Md., June 5.—(A.P.)**—The temperature continued to mount here today. The official record at 2 p. m. was 101, breaking all heat records here for June. Schools closed at noon and shops worked on half time. Four prostrations were reported.
