

SENATORS TAKE PAPERMAKERS TO 4 TO 3 TRIMMING

The Salem Senators continued their winning streak when they defeated the West Linn baseball team on the Oxford park diamond by a score of 4 to 3. The papermakers tried hard in their half of the ninth but were unable to score the tying run.

The Senators scored their first run of the game in the first inning, when Proctor, second man up, hit a homer over the right field fence. Two more tallies were registered in the third frame. Bouton, first man up went out, Bittles to Schulson; single and started to second when Rittenhouse juggled the ball but recovered in time to throw to Leide, who dropped the ball, and Proctor was safe on second. Coleman flew out to Schulson. Steers hit a home run over the left field fence that cleared the boards by feet, scoring Proctor ahead of him.

The first tally for the locals was made in the seventh inning. Barham got a single over third, Bouton sacrificed him to second. Proctor went out, Stone to Schulson, and Keene, running for Barham, went to third on the out. Coleman got a single and Keene scored.

Barham had the visitors eating out of his hands until the eighth inning. Up until this time the papermakers had only found Wayne for four hits, one in the second, third fifth and seventh. In the eighth they scored their first tally when Judd got a home run over the left field fence. In the last frame the visitors came back hard and started a rally that netted them two runs. Jones, first man up for the papermakers in the last frame, got a single; Rittenhouse got a single sending Jones to third; Gribble got a single and Jones scored, Rittenhouse going to third; Gribble went to second on a passed ball; Schulson went out to Naples; Stone went out Bouton to Keene; Rittenhouse scoring and Gribble going to third on the play; Bittles hit the ball to Bouton and nearly beat the ball but he was out for the third out by a hair or the game might have gone into extra innings.

The papermakers completed two snappy double plays to the locals one. Bittles buried nice ball for the losers but was substituted after issuing four free passes to first and allowing four hits for the locals three runs. Bittles went into right field and Stone into the box. Up until the last inning the locals were ahead of the visitors in the number of hits. The last frame netted the papermakers three hits for a total of eight to the locals six. Keene and Bill Steers both played excellent ball, turning in some nice plays. The raw decision was made in the fifth with Pottritz on second, the locals caught him six feet off of the base but the umpire failed to see the play and refused to call him out.

Next Saturday the locals will meet the Luckenbach Ship company.

STATE DEFICIT OF \$628,396 ON JANUARY 1 SEEN

An estimate prepared by Secretary of State Sam A. Koser and presented to the state emergency board at its meeting here Saturday indicates that on December 31, 1925, the state of Oregon, because of the low tax levy made by the state tax commission last December and because of the referendum of the tobacco tax and the titling acts, will face a deficit of \$628,396.10.

This predicted shortage is not as large as has been previously predicted by some other state officials. One source of partial relief will be the imposition of the old state income tax of 1923, now repealed upon the dividends of corporations, through an opinion of the supreme court and on the basis of which collections are now being made. This will bring in several hundred thousand dollars more than had been expected of the income tax.

The Koser estimate shows that the total obligations of the state for the present biennium within the 6 per cent tax limitation are \$9,286,116.76. Total revenues from all sources are estimated at \$8,757,520.66. This indicates the estimated deficiency of over \$600,000 as above stated.

Had the tobacco tax and the titling act become operative as contemplated on May 28, instead of having been referred, Mr. Koser estimates that the state would have been ahead about \$750,000 by the end of 1926.

GRADUATES HEAR BACCALAUREATE SERMON SUNDAY

"The Dynamic of Progress," was the title of the baccalaureate sermon delivered by Rev. John Evans in the First Christian church before the graduating class of Salem high school and a crowd which occupied every seat and all available standing room in the church auditorium.

"Not disobedient to the Heavenly vision," indicates the real dynamic, a spiritual objective, according to Rev. Mr. Evans. That hidden quality in life, gentleness, justice, mercy, faith, hope, love—all spiritual elements, silently "fashioning the talents at our command and directing to definite attainments."

History tells of the successes of great men and intends to give the secrets of their greatness, the speaker stated, but there is that dynamic that has made success possible to all of them, a common principle of work in every successful life. The source of this power is not merely intellectual supremacy, he declared. "The man who knows" has a distinct advantage and learning should be acquired, but knowledge in itself does not make for progress, it is only a factor that helps in the progress.

Neither, he said, is wealth and superior social advantage the source of that power. The greatest men have come out of poverty and the dark background of struggle. Neither special opportunity nor "the times" give full explanation of greatness, Rev. Evans declared. Lincoln would have been as great in the days of Rome as in his own age, for he possessed the dynamic

that works in every age. "Paul's defense before Agrippa," he said, was explained in the statement, "XXI was not disobedient to the Heavenly vision. Pasteur kept the following beautiful sentiment ever before him: 'Happy is man who has a deity within, an ideal of beauty which he obeys, an ideal of art, an ideal of country, an ideal of religion.'"

"Failure to recognize this principle of the dynamic of progress," said the speaker, "will give system without heart, talent without purpose, personality without religion, and ultimately destroy the whole."

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
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
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
