Local playgoers will rejoice to learn that "The Show-Off," authoritatively proclaimed by the professional critics in New York as "the supreme American comedy," will be given at the Grand theater, Salem, for one night only, Monday, June 15.

George Kelly takes the average American home and has fun with it. It has been said that home is no longer an institution; that it is a stupid relic of former times; that it is irritable and unnecessary and deadening in its effect; and lots of pronouncements of the same order, filling the air. Perhaps it is, who shall say? But "The Show-Off" is always admirably droll and realizes to the full all of possibilities of arch characterization. Kelly's picture of a "four-flusher" is simply irresistible and his views of the struggles of a humble-life family to achieve material comfort are photographic to a remarkable degree.

"The Show-Off" has been staged by Mr. Kelly himself and shows intimate knowledge of the art of achieving effects while causing them to seem to happen naturally from character and situation. It is at once an artful and an adroit piece of stage direction. The "business" is so excellent, the little touches and the delicate suggestions so deft while adhering to the sense of decision and logic. The whole performance represents a triumph of team work. What is more remarkable is that nobody plays to the audience. As far as the cast is concerned there is no audience. This method though rarely tried never fails. Yet stupid "favorites" will stand in the center of the stage looking and speaking directly at their audience.

PIONEER WOMAN GOES TO REWARD

Mrs. Nancy Dolman, 87-year-old pioneer and resident of Salem, mother of Dr. W. B. Morse and sister of Chief Justice T. A. McBride, died Monday afternoon at the family residence at 533 Center street. She was the last living charter member of the First Christian church, Salem.

She came to Oregon in 1846, crossing the plains with her father's family. She first married William B. Morse and they lived at Lafayette, Salem and St. Helens. Several years after the death of her first husband she married William H. Dolman of St. Helens, who moved to Salem six years ago. She had celebrated two silver wedding anniversaries.

In addition to Dr. Morse and Justice McBride, Mrs. Dolman is survived by a brother, Dr. James McBride of Pasadena, Cal., and a foster daughter, Mrs. J. A. Richardson of Portland, formerly of Salem.

Funeral services are to be held at 10 a. m. Wednesday, and the body will be forwarded to Portland for cremation. Rev. John Evans of the First Christian church here will officiate at both services.
