

THREE TEACHERS ARE ELECTED BY SCHOOL BOARD

Miss Margaret Evans, daughter of Rev. John Evans, pastor of the First Christian church of Salem, was last night elected to a position as instructor in English in Junior high school in Salem, by official action of the school board.

Miss Evans graduates this week from the California state normal school at San Jose. She will receive the regular salary of \$120 a month if she accepts the position.

De Los Robertson and Aubrey Fletcher, two students of Willamette university, were elected to take charge of physical education classes one working in the forenoon and the other in the afternoon. Each will receive \$60 a month.

Action was taken by the board which will result in notice being given one present occupant of the house belonging to the board, located on State street opposite the court house, that a lease, which expires on September 1, will not be renewed.

In accordance with the policy of the board, which is to trade one third of the typewriters at high school for new typewriters each year, decision was made last night to trade in 14 of the school's typewriters.

Decision was made to pay teachers their wages when out on account of the serious illness of immediate relatives, paying the amount with the regular monthly payroll.

The technicality of authorizing graduation of the present senior class, consisting of 232 students, was passed through. Various other routine matters, particularly relating to supplies, were referred to the proper committees for future action.

SCHOOL BOARD LEAVES MATTER OF COACH IN AIR

The possibility of a coachless year for Salem high school athletics looms as a result of action taken by the school board last night. Following report made by Superintendent Hug to the effect that the student council had voted to appropriate only \$500 toward the coach's salary even that sum being taken from the fund already promised the board for the purpose of constructing the athletic field east of Parrish Junior high school, the board deliberately passed over the question of filling the coaching berth at the high school, leaving the matter entirely in the air.

"I don't see why the taxpayer should pay the entire salary of the coach," said P. M. Gregory, member of the board. "The district already pays for a large part of what they use for their athletics and charges them nothing for it. Many think it's a mistake to pay anything at all toward athletics."

No motion was made, and Dr. H. H. Glines, chairman of the board asked for none. So far as the coaching situation is concerned the board might as well not have met last night.

It is thought that some man will be secured as coach, however, although in all probability Hollis Huntington, present occupant of the position is definitely out. The next man will be a regular full

Washington, June 10.—(A. P.)—The dirigible Shenandoah will attempt a flight to Minnesota in place of the disabled Los Angeles, but the date for the cruise is indefinite.

The Shenandoah is to fly to Portland, Maine, July 4, for the governor's conference there, but will make the Minnesota voyage before then if it can be inflated soon enough. Otherwise the trip will follow the Portland flight.

EFFORT TO MOVE CANTON BATTLE INTO OPEN FIELDS

Canton, June 10.—(By Associated Press)—Efforts of the Canton chamber of commerce to induce rival Chinese leaders, now fighting for possession of Canton, to move the seat of warfare outside the business district failed today. The commander of the Yunnanese troops is unwilling to leave his present position because he is drawing a large income from gambling, opium sales and various other sources.

The Yunnanese troops are apparently preparing for a long siege having brought field guns to the street approaches leading directly to the river front. The Yunnanese are searching to find further supplies of ammunition. With the approach of the Kwangtung troops, the Yunnanese troops, who hold Canton, were entrenching themselves. Both the attacking and defending troops claim the advantage in the fighting thus far.

Four bolshevik Russians, attempted to gain admittance into the foreign concession today were refused entrance by the British authorities. The city police force has been disbanded. Chinese newspapers have suspended publication.


