

PRICE HELD UP ON PRODUCE OF GOLDEN STATE

Portland, June 12—California shippers are holding up the price on produce grown in the sunshine state.

The unfavorable growing season in the south and the resulting short crop have placed California growers in a position to dictate prices.

Weather conditions here during the past two weeks have been decidedly unfavorable to any big increase in the movement of produce.

Most produce dealers say that business is poor and the demand light, yet prices have held firm due to the advancing market at shipping points.

The strawberry is well advanced and prices will be on the upward trend from now on.

Butter and eggs are unchanged on the local board.

Markets, however, on both commodities are in a good healthy condition due to continued advances in the south.

Butter is going into the cooler higher than it came out last year.

FRUIT OUTLOOK NOT FAVORABLE

Washington, June 12—The present outlook for fruit crops is rather unfavorable, the department of agriculture crop officials declare.

The condition of apples on June 1 was nearly 10 per cent below the usual average on that date, they said.

"Frost in late May," a statement said, "reduced prospects in many scattered localities. Northwestern states expect more apples than were picked last year but for the country as a whole the crop does not seem likely to be as large."

"Each producer shows a large increase in California, where most of the crop is canned or dried but in practically all other important states the crop is expected to be substantially smaller than last year."

"The pear crop also is only fair, California being the only important producing state which expects a materially larger crop than was harvested last year."

According to reports on the street both Harold Day and James H. Linn have paid 16 cents for spot hops within the past few days about 2000 bales being involved.

This is the highest price yet paid for the 1924 crop, as far as is known.

The 1925 crop is reported to be looking good. There are some attacks of mildew due to cloudy weather but nothing that cannot be kept subdued by proper methods it is stated.

Word also has been received here by local dealers of aphid attacks on the English hop crop.

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WOOL MARKET STRONGER WITH MOHAIR STEADY

Boston, Mass., June 12—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say:

A stronger, broader market has been in evidence again this week, both in the country and at the seaboard points.

Prices are at the fifty cent level for the better bright wools in the country, while the seaboard markets are several cents behind country values, as a rule although two to three cents a pound higher in the grade than last week.

The foreign markets are rather irregular, Bradford prices favoring the buyer. Rather more activity is reported from the river Platte, with prices showing a very slight tendency to strengthen.

The Australian program is yet to be determined. Mohair is steady on moderate business.

ORDER REVISION OF GRAIN RATES

Washington, June 12—The Interstate Commerce Commission today ordered a revision of rates on grain, grain products and hay from numerous points in Idaho, Montana, Oregon, Utah, Wyoming, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska and Oklahoma to points in the southeast and the lower Mississippi.

October 4 was named as the effective date for the changes. Points of origin affected are on the Oregon Short Line and its connections and the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific.

The rate structure in many cases it was held the charging of higher rates for short hauls than is charged for long hauls over the same line and in the same direction.

In the rate readjustment latitude will be given to the railroads and they may rectify the long and short haul violation either by raising the long haul rates or decreasing the short haul rates, or both.

STRAWBERRY PRICES ADVANCE BY JUMPS

According to reports barreled strawberries are commanding high prices and the price level is constantly shooting upwards.

A local broker reports that strawberries which he offered for a certain canner no longer ago at \$10.50 have advanced by a series of jumps of \$12.50. The berries are reported to be pretty well sold and there are few left to go even at that price.

PEAR PRICES EXPECTED

It is rumored here that by June 15 the California growers will announce their opening price on California pears.

The manager of the association has been in the Yakima country looking over the situation there and is reported to be just ready to return to California.

It is expected the announcement of opening prices will follow short by his return home.
