

SENATORS LOSE TO LUCKENBACH BY SCORE 5 TO 2

The Salem Senators suffered their first defeat of the season in the interstate league series on the Oxford park diamond yesterday afternoon at the hands of the strong Luckenbach ship company nine by a score of 5 to 2. The visitors played exceptional ball and the locals were helpless at the hands of the Luckenbach hurler, Rudy Kallio, late of the Boston Americans, and released by them to the Salt Lake club of the Pacific Coast League.

The locals started the game in good form when they scored in the first frame. Bouton got on first on Stranahan's error. Proctor sacrificed him to second and he went to third on a passed ball. Bill Steers struck at a wild one but singled through the pitcher's box on the next ball and Bouton crossed the platter. Keene fanned.

The visitors scored in the second inning. Clark was issued a walk. Carroll fanned. Parks got on first on Bouton's error and Clark stepped at third. Parks going to second. Kallio got a hit into short center and Clark tied the score. Kallio went to second when Helmeke walked and filled the bases with only one out. Edwards caught Kallio flat footed off of second for the second out, and Stranahan went out Maples to Keene.

The locals scored again in the third. Ashby walked. Bouton was safe on Clark's error, going to second on the wild throw. Ashby stopping at third. Proctor fanned but Ashby scored on an out at first.

Umpire Ed Rankin, fined Bill King of the visiting club \$5.00 and threw him off the diamond in the last half of the ninth inning when he climbed up on the wire of the grandstand and tried a Nick Atrock stunt.

The fifth inning was the feature of the game. The locals playing some of the smartest and most spectacular ball of the season. Helmeke went out when Steers raced into left field to get the ball off of the boards with the sun in his eyes. It looked like a sure double. The second feature stunt of the inning was given when Bouton raced to deep short to cut off Stranahan's hit which was labeled safe. Blanchard worked the count to three balls and no strikes and started to go to first on the fourth ball but Rankin called it a strike. Blanchard protested vigorously but went to first on the next ball. He attempted to steal but Ashby threw to Keene who threw him out.

The visitors tied the score in the eighth inning. Stranahan was safe on Bouton's error. Blanchard flew out to Proctor. Goleman got a double. Barham relieved Ashby. Clymes got a fielders choice when Stranahan started to score. Stranahan was out by miles but Maples threw the ball in the dirt and Stranahan failed, tying the score at 2 all. In the ninth the shipbuilders scored three runs.

Parks, first man up got a walk. Kallio sacrificed him to second. Helmeke got a single and Parks scored. Helmeke going to second on the throw in. Stranahan got a double and Helmeke scored, the ball hitting his heel on the throw in. Blanchard singled. Goleman singled but was out trying to steal. Stranahan scored on Blanchard's singles.

The locals were unable to do anything in the last inning. The Luckenbach hurler struck out 13 of the Senators, tying the diamond dust four times. Steers and Barr got the only two hits of the game. The Senators made a good showing against the hurling of Rudy Kallio, who was in fine form.

DIVORCE GIVEN JOSEPHINE COOK

Helding that William Cook, defendant, was guilty of cruel and inhuman conduct, Circuit Judge L. H. McMahan, Saturday, granted the divorce plea of Josephine Cook, directing that the plaintiff should have custody of Oren Cook, minor child, and should receive \$20 a month for his support.

Brandishing of a razor with threats to kill the defendant, frequent drunkenness and disorderly conduct, and infidelity to the marriage vows were among the charges alleged in the complaint which formally charged cruel and inhuman treatment and proof of which is acknowledged in the findings of fact of the court. Cook is now being held in the county jail awaiting the action of the Marion county grand jury on charges of contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

Content of the divorce proceedings centered around the challenge on the part of the defendant of the jurisdiction of the court, alleging that because of a recent trip out of the state, the statutory requirement of residence here was not fulfilled. The couple was married October 12, 1920.

CHRIST IS ALL SAYS POLING IN SUNDAY SERMON

The subject of the sermon presented Sunday morning by Dr. C. C. Poling, pastor of the First Evangelical church of Salem, was "Christ in All in All," based on Colossians 3-11. He said in part, "In these words, 'Christ is all,' we find the essence of Christianity—for Christ is Christianity. Without Him and His presence there is nothing that is distinctly Christian. Other religions may be separated from their founders and we may take any feature or teaching away without destroying its force. But if we separate any truth from Christ, it has lost its peculiar character. In Him all fullness dwells. In the beginning was the word, and the word was God—and the word was made flesh and dwelt among us, and we beheld His glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father, full of grace and truth." (Jno. 1:11 and 14.)

"Christ is coeval with every good—He is answerable to every condition. He is a physician to the soul; a counselor to guide, a king to govern, a friend to sympathize, a father to provide. He is the foundation to sustain; He the root to enliven—He is all in all. This 'Christ is all' is an absolute truth. He who can say that Christ to him is all and in all, in truth, is a Christian. And he who cannot say this is weighed in the balance and found wanting."

Dr. Poling stressed the point that Christ is all by way of eminence, national distinction and derivation, as well as in regard to righteousness. "He is exalted above principalities and powers," said Dr. Poling. In regard to Christ's righteousness he quoted from First Corinthians 1-20: "Christ is all in regard to peace," he said. "Peace with ourselves, with our fellow men, and peace with God. He makes peace in the court of Heaven, and also in the court of conscience. Not only this, but He will make peace for the nations of the earth. Real peace is alone found in Jesus Christ."

"Christ is all in regard to regeneration. He rewards us here and will crown us after our labors and sufferings are over. He is the door to the storehouse of all God's blessings and provisions of grace, in whom are hid all the treasures of wisdom. (Col. 2-3)."

GOVERNOR SETS FOURTH ASIDE AS DEFENSE DAY

Governor Pierce on Saturday issued two proclamations, one setting aside July 4 as National Defense Test day in Oregon, in accordance with the national movement, and the other setting aside the week of June 29 to July 4 to enlist memberships in the Stop Forest Fires association.

"America will never enter a war of conquest," says the former proclamation. "In the march of nations toward world peace America must lead. Preparedness to defend is not militarism, and grant that the occasion may never arise when we must defend our land from attack, but should the time again come when our boys must go into bloody conflict, may they have at least the rudiments of military training in that trying hour when they are called on to face a trained and seasoned enemy."

The proclamation asks the citizens of Oregon to participate in the event, "not for the purpose of arousing a military spirit, but rather that we, ourselves, may know, and the world realize, that the spirit of our fathers, which made America possible, the same spirit which led our flag to victory every struggle from Revolutionary days to the dark hours of the World War, still vibrate in the land that gave free government to the world."

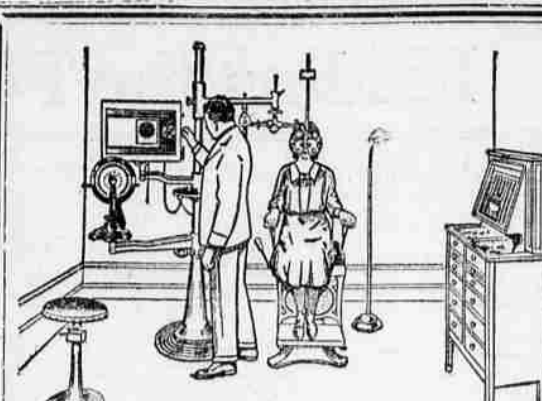
