

RAIN KEEPS NEW CITY PAVER IDLE AS TIME SPEEDS

The new Smith street paver, for which the city of Salem paid \$6999 about two months ago is all right if the weather is perfectly fair. But after a light rain or a night of heavy fog the machine is as useless for paving streets as a kid's express wagon.

The machine is supposed to have a paving capacity of something like 1200 square yards, a block or thereabouts, every day. But during the entire first half of June, because of rain and fog, the machine hasn't turned a wheel.

Explanation is made that the paver itself is all right. It would work right along if sand and gravel could be gotten to it. But if the dirt surface of an unpaved street is a little wet it is heavy motor trucks of the sand and gravel company with which the city has contracted for material are unable to reach the paving machine. Under the old system of paving streets, used up to this year, the method was for the trucks to haul the material to the street and strew it along the edges of the street when even convenient. It might be several days before the paving actually is started. But under the new system it is necessary for the trucks, each hauling three cubic yards, to drive to the paver and dump the sand and gravel directly into the machine as it operates. And if the trucks can't get to the paver, the paver can't operate.

Discussion of the paver came up at the city council meeting last night in connection with a bid on a street grader and skimmer that the city may purchase. Concerning the paver, now idle, Alderman Rosebraugh expressed the opinion that with the coming of good weather it would soon catch up with its work.

The council rejected the bid of \$6700 for the grader, but several other bids on gasoline machines are still under consideration.

JEFFERSON REELECTS SCHOOL OFFICIALS

Jefferson, Or., June 16.—A school meeting was held at the school house Monday afternoon. The purpose of the meeting was to elect a school board member to serve for three years and a clerk to serve for a year. W. E. Smith was re-elected as a school board member and Mrs. S. A. Pease was re-elected as clerk.

NEER ELECTED OVER TIBBETS BY BIG MARGIN

Polling 398 votes against his rival's 154, Frank Neer was elected school director in yesterday's election. He will be sworn into office on June 23, the next regular meeting of the board. He succeeds Curtis Cross, who declined to become a candidate for reelection.

Issues of the election, centering in a large measure around the question of re-distribution of insurance business on school buildings, failed to arouse any considerable interest in the voting public, the total vote cast being less than half the number a year ago when Neer was defeated by H. H. Olinger and Roy Simeral in a close contest.

J. C. Tibbets, defeated candidate, this morning stated that he had "no bitterness" over the election's result, although he might have wished it to go the other way. "I wish Mr. Neer the best of success," he said, "and I know for one thing that I've escaped a lot of grief by not being elected." Tibbets declared that one of the greatest indications of the election to him was the apparent lack of interest on the part of the public, which he described as "lamentable."

There were 537 persons in the city entitled to vote, he stated, and of the number only 552 votes were cast, with perhaps 100 more being unable to vote because of arriving too late due to a misunderstanding regarding closing time at the polls. Advertisements by both candidates had indicated that the polls would close at 8 p. m., one hour later than the actual closing time.

COUNCIL VOTES CURB UPON SALE OF FIREWORKS

An ordinance was introduced and passed at the city council meeting last night to curb the sale of firecrackers and other fireworks by Salem dealers as a precaution against fire.

The ordinance provides that the dealer must obtain a permit for sale from the mayor, and provision will be made under the ordinance possible for the sales to be allowed a day or two in advance of the Fourth of July. The ordinance was introduced for the reason that dealers already are selling firecrackers and boys firing them indiscriminately around town. For violation of the ordinance a dealer can be fined up to \$500.

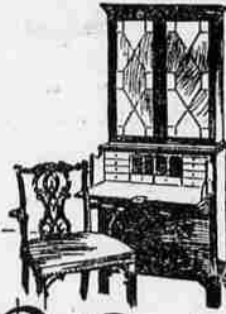
Ordinances increasing the cost of improving the alleys in blocks 8 and 20 were passed.

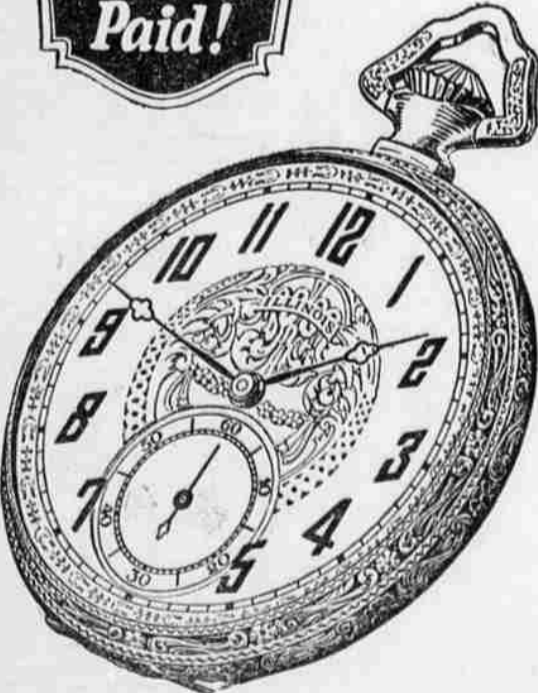
