

KOZER ASKS FOR RULING ON RIGHT OF BEALS TO PAY

Secretary of State Kozier yesterday placed before Attorney General Van Winkle the question as to his duty in respect to issuing warrants on vouchers received from the state fish commission if the vouchers are signed by Beals as one of the majority members of the commission and whether it will be legal for him to issue warrants to Beals on his personal claims for service on the commission.

Beals, who is state senator from Tillamook county, was recently appointed by Governor Pierce as a member of the fish commission and the question has arisen whether he can legally serve on the commission since he is a member of the state senate. Kozier's letter cites section 10, article 11, of the state constitution, which says:

"No person holding a lucrative office or appointment under the United States or under this state will be eligible to a seat in the legislative assembly; nor shall any person hold more than one lucrative office at the same time, except as in this constitution expressly permitted; provided, that officers in the militia, to which there is attached no annual salary, and the office of postmaster, where the compensation does not exceed \$100 per annum, shall not be deemed lucrative."

Another excerpt from the constitution quoted in section 1, article 3, which says:

"The powers of the government shall be divided into three separate departments, the legislative, the executive, including the administrative, and the judicial; and no person charged with official duties under one of these departments shall exercise any of the functions of another, except as in this constitution expressly provided."

Under the law members of the fish commission receive \$5 a day while on official duty, and though they are limited to \$200 a year, they could seemingly come under the constitutional inhibition against holders of lucrative office occupying seats in the legislature.

The reference to the three departments of state government, and the provision that "no person charged with official duties under one of these departments shall exercise any of the functions of the other," has reference to Beals holding a legislative and an administrative office at the same time.

Beals' appointment is already effective. At the time he was appointed the governor also appointed State Senator S. M. Garland of Lebanon on the commission, who is to take office later in the summer. When he takes office the

DAYLIGHT TO BE SEEN THRU TUNNEL FRIDAY

Bend, Or., June 17.—Daylight is expected to be seen through the tunnel under the Cascade on the Natron cutoff sometime Friday according to telephone reports from Stewart & Welch, contractors in charge, this morning. Celebrations by and for the workmen will be held at each end of the tunnel Sunday.

The tunnel when daylight is cut through, will be little more than high enough for workmen to get through below the timbers, according to W. J. Perry, lumber forester for the Deschutes national forest, who returned this morning from several days at Odell lake. He has been in charge of the timber being cut from the national forests for the tunnel timbers and tunnel "packing."

MAGGABEES PLAN BIG PICNIC HERE

A Maccabee state picnic will be held on the state fair grounds at Salem on Saturday, June 20, which will conclude with the initiation of a class of fifty candidates. Maccabees, both Ladies and Sir Knights, will be in attendance from Portland, Albany, Corvallis, Jefferson, Mill City, Linnnton, Salem and many other points and the class of candidates will be furnished from these localities. Tent No. 90 at Mill City already has 29 young active men examined and ready for the ceremony.

STRIKERS LOOT AND BURN SHOPS AND COLLIERIES

Sydney, N. S., June 17.—Incendiarism and looting attending the strike of 12,000 miners broke out with renewed vigor Tuesday despite the presence of more than 500 dominion troops and special miners' police.

The Bankhead screen of the unused colliery of the British Empire Steel corporation at New Aberdeen, was destroyed by fire. Barbed wire entanglements had been thrown about property, search lights were playing and troopers were on guard throughout the night.

Retail stores owned by private individuals at Bras d'Or and Florence were looted by mobs of several hundred men. The mobs give the appearance of armed camps. More troops were reported on the way from Ottawa and Toronto, including detachments of the famous royal dragoons.

The walkout in the Cape Breton area was called by United Mine Workers officials last March as

the result of a wage dispute with the company during which the miners' credit at the stores had been cut off.

James Murdock, Canadian minister of labor, arrived here today to offer his services as mediator in what he has called the "too long drawn out" struggle between the steel corporation and the miners. He will study the situation from both sides.

New York, June 17.—(A. P.)—Babe Ruth scored his third home run of the season today, a drive into the right field bleachers at the Yankee Stadium. The blow, made against Whitehill of Detroit, followed a three-base misjudgment of Shank's fly by Manager Ty Cobb of the Tigers.
