ROTARIANS ARE HOSTS TO LOCAL WRITERS TODAY

Six writers for national magazines, all of them residents of Salem, appeared before the Salem Rotary club at its weekly luncheon this noon and read samples, either poetry or prose, of their own production. Five of the six were women, Charles Lisle, who has recently entered the field of editorial writing for magazines of national prominence, being the only man of the group. Miss Grace Smith was present and was introduced as assistant state attorney, being one of two women in the United States to have attained that distinction. The women writers were Ruth Fargo, Blanche M. Jones, Isabel Gray Clifford, Anna Van Huerten Nelson and Clara Virginia Barton.

"There are at least 20 writers of prominence in Salem," said C. E. Wilson, secretary of the Salem chamber of commerce, who presided at the meeting. "Oregon, and especially Salem, has attained considerable distinction as being a literary center."

Clara Virginia Barton read several poems that had previously been published in national magazines. Two of them had to do with radio, and had been published in magazines specializing in the subject.

Blanche M. Jones, former editor of prose, poetry and music, read a poem, "Blue Water," dealing with the legend of Crater Lake.

MACHINERY FOR MILL DUE HERE

The first of the machinery for the new linen mill here will be unloaded in Portland today and brought to Salem tomorrow by freight truck, it was announced this morning by B. C. Miles. The first shipment of seven tons of machinery arrived in Portland yesterday aboard the Furness liner Pacific Shipper.

The freight trucks will pick up the shipment from the Portland dock and bring it directly to the plant here without the necessity of an extra handling.

A second shipment of between 20 and 25 tons of new machinery is due to arrive in Portland July 3 aboard the Pacific Trader and 4 tons aboard the London Corporation. Part of the machinery comes from Belfast, Ireland, and some from Leeds, Yorkshire. It is being discharged in Portland at Terminal No. 4.
