## BODY OF FARMER FOUND IN CREEK NEAR SHERIDAN

Dallas, Or., June 18.—The body of Cyrus Blair, 66, was found in Mill creek a few hundred yards below the Blair bridge between Sheridan and Buell, Wednesday, about a half day after Mr. Blair had been missed from the house. Coroner Kenealy and Dr. V. G. Staats reached the conclusion that he had become sick and went near the creek for water and had fallen in. No inquest was held.

Mr. Blair, who was born in 1859 on the place where he died, did not return to the house for breakfast after going out to the barn or garden about 7 o'clock Wednesday morning. A daughter, Bessie Blair, searched about the garden and barn but failed to find him. The hired man, Steve Porter, took up the search about 11:30 when he came in from the field. He found him in a short time.

Mr. Blair had gone down a stopping bank to the stream, hung his hat on a piece of drift and he thought had attempted to get a drink from the stream. A clay shelf rose above two feet above the water and this bore marks, probably from his shoes. The water at the place was not over two feet in depth, but moderately swift. The body had drifted about 50 feet, through a deeper pool and lodged on a gravel bar. It was fully clothed except for the hat.

The body bore no marks of violence, and Dr. Staats said it appeared that there was little water in the lungs. It is possible that Mr. Blair might have suffered a stroke. He had had trouble with lumbago and once before had gone to the creek bank to rest when taken with a bad spell.

## WEST SALEM BOY FALLS IN RIVER AND IS DROWNED

Going swimming after being forbidden by his parents to do so, falling from a long wire swing into deep water, becoming afflicted with cramps and unable to grasp the pole which his brother reached to him when he arose to the surface for the second time, is the record of Louis Victor Deserao, lately of Branch, Mich., but recently moved to West Salem. The accident occurred at the same spot where the young Quinlan boy was thought to have drowned a year ago.

The place has been used for swimming by the youth of West Salem for a number of years. A long wire, to which a bar is attached is fastened to the top of a tree which leans over the surface of the river. Boys grasp the bar and swing out over the water, letting themselves drop when well out from the shore. The place is located a short distance south of the West Salem auto camp, where the family was staying.

It is reported that three children were burned to death at the Deserao family home in Michigan when the house there burned down previous to the time they started for Oregon. They came west with the intention of making their home near Salem. Louis, aged 15, is the fourth child of the family to die in an accident.

Yesterday's accident occurred early in the afternoon. The boy was recovered by W. H. Gerth of West Salem after a search of nearly three hours, and with the assistance of E. M. Hammer of Salem.

The drowned boy is survived by his father, mother, two sisters and two brothers.

## TO START PAVING ON CRATER LAKE ROAD SOON

Klamath Falls, Or., June 18.—Paving of both entrances to Crater Lake national park will start July 1, according to announcement made here today by William E. Arnold, superintendent of the Warren Construction company, whose firm was awarded the contract. The work will approximate 20 miles and will cost in the neighborhood of \$260,000.

Park officials will provide good detours for auto tourists during the time the paving is in progress and these will be only for short stretches. Improvement of both the Klamath Falls and Medford entrances will proceed simultaneously, the paving official announced.

## FARMERS UNION TO HOLD ANNUAL PICNIC JUNE 20

Dallas, Or., June 18.—The Polk County Farmers Union is planning on making its annual picnic Saturday, June 20, at Kieckhefer park, a big event. The affair is open to all who wish to attend and a program of speaking, music and sports is being arranged.

James S. Burch of the Oregon Agricultural college has been secured as the principal speaker of the day.

Final arrangements were made at a meeting of the program committee on Tuesday night at the T. J. Alsip farm. A large number besides the committee was present and a whole roast featured the affair. Mrs. Chambers of Monday lead the group in community singing. About 150 were out for the occasion.

## POURING CONCRETE FOR ALBANY BRIDGE PIERS

Albany, June 18.—The pouring of approximately 35,000 cubic yards of cement in the coffer dams prepared to build the five piers in the river channel of the state high way bridge crossing the Willamette river here will be completed within the next few days, reports Superintendent Wheaton.

Owing to some bad luck on building pier number three, the work has been detained a few days. The work of the fourth pier in placing the cement is now on with the fifth the last of the number, to be built within the next few days.

The piers on an average require approximately 700 cubic yards of cement. The piers extend about 13 feet below the bottom of the river which on an average is 25 feet deep.

The laying of the steel will begin in about two weeks. This work will not be detained on account of the piers not being seasoned, as but little of the weight is placed on them in the preliminary work, it is reported. The builders anticipate no further delay on account of weather conditions or materials.

## COUNTY COURT TO INSPECT ROAD

Members of the Marion county court will go to Detroit Friday to inspect the new Detroit-Niagara highway where they are to pass upon the work recently done on the \$300,000 project into the heart of the forest reserve. The grading on the highway has already been completed and the roadway is now being laid, preparatory to surfacing. The county has an interest amounting to \$20,000 in the highway.

Word from the state department received last week announced that government representatives had approved the work and that it would be completed as soon as the approval of the county court had been secured. Definite plans have not been made on the extension of the highway into the Fish lake district.

## JUNIOR GOLFERS TO PLAY AT CORVALLIS

The red and black golf team will go to Corvallis next Saturday where they are to meet the Corvallis and Eugene teams on the Corvallis course. This will be the final match of the season, which will determine the state championship for the high school teams outside of Portland. They are playing for the Clifford Brown silver cup.

The local team has a good start for the championship as they won the first two matches with ease and are expecting to do the same in this meeting. The locals now have a standing of 53 according to the Nassau system of scoring.

## DAUGHTER OF PIONEER OREGONIAN PASSES ON

Tacoma, Wash., June 18.—Mrs. Elizabeth M. Harris, last of the children of General Morton M. McCarter, pioneer legislator of the old Oregon territory and of California, died here yesterday at the age of 73 years. Her father for many years commanded an important place in the pioneer life of Oregon, Washington and California and was recorded as one of the originators of the territorial law of Oregon, the first legislation of the kind in the United States.

He came to Oregon in 1843 with the party led by Peter H. Burnett, first governor of Oregon. He was commissary general of Oregon territory during the Indian wars of 1855 and 1856.

The right rear fender of the car struck her, throwing her to the ground and breaking her shoulder and hip and badly bruising her.
