

### NORTH BEND MAN IS PRESIDENT OF BOOSTER CLUBS

Election of officers which placed M. S. Taylor of North Bend in the presidency for the coming year organization of plans for an auto caravan trip into California next year, and plans for hospitality day at the state fair here this fall, commanded principal attention in the second annual convention of the Oregon Hospitality club which met here yesterday. Fifteen booster organizations throughout the state were represented.

Acting on the suggestion of Irving E. Vining of Ashland, the head of the state chamber of commerce, the organization unanimously voted to promote an auto caravan trip into California in which all of the booster clubs of the state should take part. It is planned to go as far south as Stockton, then to Oakland and San Francisco, to return by way of Eureka and the Redwood highway.

Through the co-operation of the state fair board plans were laid to set aside Friday, October 2, as Hospitality day at the state fair this fall. Ella S. Wilson, secretary of the fair board, has announced the offer of three silver cups for the booster organization making the best attendance record, and having the best drilled team with the most unique offerings.

Representatives of the Roseburg Umpqua Indians who were present yesterday issued a challenge to any other marching organization for a contest at the fair which will be met by several of the others.

M. S. Taylor, newly elected president, succeeds Al Pierce, formerly of Salem, and organizer of the Hospitality club. Taylor is a former Captain Kidd of the Coos Bay Pirates. W. R. Allen of Grants Pass was elected to the vice presidency.

Fifteen booster clubs will be asked to send representatives on the caravan trip to California next May as follows: Salem Cherrians, Portland Roarers, Newberg Bersers, Umpqua Chiefs of Roseburg, Grants Pass Cavemen, Coos Bay Pirates, Medford Craters, Ashland, Lithians, Klamath Falls Pelicans, Vancouver Furriers, Bend Lava Bears, Oakland Gobblers, Bendon Beachmen, Albany Phenants and Eugene Radiators.

### GROUND BROKEN FOR NEW SCHOOL

Ground was broken this morning at the site of the new St. Vincent de Paul parochial parochial school at the corner of Myrtle and Columbia streets. The cornerstone will be laid July 19, at the time of the feast of St. Vincent de Paul. It is expected that the building will be ready for occupancy by the fall term, which begins in September.

The structure will have the mission style of architecture. It will measure 110 by 60 feet, be modern and fireproof throughout, and will be constructed of reinforced concrete. No construction contracts have been let, all work being personally planned and supervised by Father Keenen, local priest.

On July 19, the date tentatively set for laying the cornerstone, a formal program of dedication will be held.

### SALEM COMPANY GETS CONTRACT FOR PAVILION

Offering a bid of \$18,015, the Cherry City Construction company of Salem won the contract award from the state board of control Wednesday for construction of a new pavilion at the state tuberculosis hospital. Money for the building was appropriated by the 1925 legislature.

J. A. Bernard of Salem was the successful bidder for the heating contract, with a bid of \$28,624.22, and William F. Bunce of Portland got the plumbing contract with a bid of \$2154.

### VARIED PROGRAM FOR CHAUTAUQUA HERE ANNOUNCED

The most serious lecture of the course is that of Colonel (Rev.) George Faltie, pastor of the Canadian Memorial church at Vancouver, B. C., and former chaplain in the World war, who will speak on "The Problem of World Peace."

Unusually fitted to handle this subject through a personal study of European countries and peoples, Dr. Faltie has gained an enviable reputation with this lecture.

The Charles Mitchell Mixer Concert Trio will introduce classical numbers for violin, cello and piano with pianologues interpreting characters.
