ENDORSE SALE OF LIGHT PLANT AT FALLS CITY

Falls City, June 19.—At the Commercial club meeting held here Wednesday evening, there was quite a lively discussion about the sale of the light plant and a straw vote was taken with the result of 14 to 2 in favor of selling.

There seems to be many rumors afloat as to the cost of putting in meters, and it was explained by Mr. Pope that meters will be required to deposit the sum of \$23 on their meters, which sum will be returned to them with six per cent interest when they move, property owners will not have to make a deposit.

The light board made a report regarding the plant and its condition at present and pronounced it as so much junk.

The average monthly income on light service not including city lights is \$216.55 and the average cost of labor per month is \$200.39. The cost of damages, \$13,846.03, cost of time \$222.54 and the cost of the pipe line \$1923.55 and cost of the plant to date is \$17,551.85.

The sale is to be voted upon next Tuesday, June 23, and every legal voter is urged to be present and vote. This means the women as well as the men.

TO CANVASS VOTE RESULTS MONDAY

Officials canvass the votes of Monday's school election of union district No. 1 at Gervais will not be made until Monday morning. It was announced today by Mr. Mary L. Ferguson, county superintendent of schools. The absence of the county court commissioners who will be in Detroit, Friday, and the eighth grade graduation Saturday has made it impossible for the election board to meet before that time, it was said.

The board which will make the official canvass is composed of the county court together with the county superintendent. Unofficial reports from the six districts in the union received yesterday indicated that the move to dissolve the union district, and carried by one vote. It is possible, however, that the official canvass Monday will change this result. In case the victory falls to either side by a small margin it is likely that the opposition will demand a complete investigation into the validity of all votes, it is believed.

MONMOUTH CONSTABLE IS SUED FOR DAMAGES

Dallas, Or., June 19.—William Mulkey Jr., constable of Monmouth and Independence, is defendant in a \$10,000 damage suit filed in circuit court by Mrs. Arkie Pugh and Arthur Pugh of Independence. They allege that Constable Mulkey made an attack upon Mrs. Pugh, beating her severely.

The affair occurred early in June, when Mulkey, who had arrested a son-in-law of the couple for the Salem authorities, took him to the house to allow him to change his clothes. Mulkey's version of the affair was that he was set upon by Mrs. Pugh and had to defend himself. The Pughs are asking \$5000 punitive damages and \$5000 actual damages.

PAPERMAKERS LOSE TO EAGLES

The papermakers of the Sunday league lost to the Eagles on the Oxford park diamond last night by a score of 6 to 4, in one of the best played games of the league. The teams were deadlocked at 4-4 at the end of the game and were forced to play an extra inning to decide the victor. The win for the Eagles tied them for first place honors with the Pulp team, both teams winning three games and losing one. The WOW team is in third place with a percentage of 500 and the PEP nine is trailing along in the cellar with no wins as yet.

In both cases the ball was lost in the grass, and while the players were searching for the ball the batter raced around the bases for the honors.

Lauterback, for the papermill team, pitched a good game with Wilkinson performing behind the bat. Green and Connor formed the battery for the winners. The papermill nine has won victories over all of the teams in the league with the exception of the Eagles. A large crowd attended the game.

28 OIL LEASES FILED IN POLK

Dallas, Or., June 19.—More concrete evidence of proposed oil development in this section developed this week when 28 oil leases were recorded by the Garber Development company of Seattle with the county clerk. A number of these leases, which are for five-year periods, contained the proviso that they are void if drilling is not started within a radius of three miles of the property in one year.

The land covered by the leases recorded extends in a two-mile swath from the Richmond road north to the Dallas-Ferrydale road northwesterly to the Holmes Gap country. It includes the Casa Riggs place, where there is now a natural gas well.

The leases call for 1 1/2 per cent of the oil taken from the property and for payment for natural gas as struck in commercial quantities. If oil wells come in within a drainage radius, drilling must be started under the lease within 90 days.

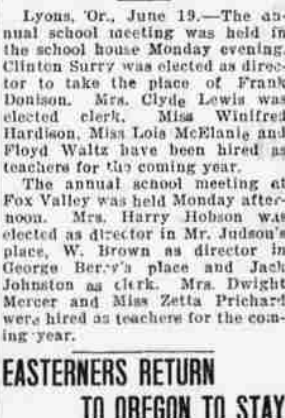

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LATIN LEAGUE RAPS KELLOGG

Buenos Aires, June 19.—(A. P.)—The attitude of the United States toward Mexico, as expressed in Secretary of State Kellogg's recent declaration is condemned in a statement issued by the Latin American Union over the signature of its president, Alfredo P. Lacio.

The Union considers Secretary Kellogg's statements as showing "that want of respect for the sovereignty of our people, which is characteristic of the White House whatsoever be the Pan-American principles which it pretends to support regarding the legal equality of nations."

In conclusion the statement says: "The Latin American Union extends to General Calles (the Mexican president) its fervent sympathy.

"In energetically defending the outraged sovereignty of his country, he defends at the same time the independence of Latin America, now threatened by the insidious imperialism of Wall Street."

PROBE WRECK OF LIMITED TRAIN

Kenton, Ohio, June 19.—The Ohio public utilities commission today was making an investigation of the wreck of the Detroit-Cincinnati Flyer on the Big Four railroad at Glycer, one mile north of here late yesterday, causing the death of two persons and the injury of 15 others.

The dead are C. C. Woodward, Toledo, Ohio, news dealer on the train, and John James, 39, Detroit. None of the injured were seriously hurt. Hospital attendants said.

Running full speed into an open siding the engine and three cars of a six-car train turned over. Trains on the line were being detoured over the siding while repair work was being done on the main line but trainmen on the limited declared they had not received orders to slow down for the siding. Both engineer and fireman escaped uninjured.
