

STATE WOODMEN TO HOLD SESSION HERE NEXT WEEK

Initiation of between 1000 and 1500 new members of the W. O. W. lodge will be held on Saturday, June 27, the new members coming from all parts of Oregon, and will meet at the state fair grounds at Salem. Approximately 100 camps will be represented here. Members and new members, with their families, are expected from every section of the state.

At last night's meeting of the local camp 31 applications were acted upon, making a total of 175 secured during the past 90 days of the Woodmen's membership drive, and bringing the total membership of the camp up to 825.

Head camp officers from Denver, Colorado, will all be present at the state meet.

A general program was given in honor of the sister society to the local W. O. W. camp last night. A group from St. Paul's Episcopal church gave a drama entitled, "Ain't Women Wonderful," and another entitled "Considerable Courtship." The camp's seven-piece orchestra gave several musical numbers.

FRENCH TO WAR ON COMMUNISTS

Paris, June 20.—(By the Associated Press)—The French government is resolved to put an end to the communist agitation in France against the military operations in Morocco where Riffian tribesmen under Abd-el-Krim have invaded the French protectorate.

It is declared that the government stands ready to arrest the active communist leaders, whether deputies or private citizens, when their activities endanger the security of the French soldiers or take the form of intelligence with the enemy.

Some fifty or more arrests have already been made in provincial towns, especially garrioted cities, during the last ten days. Those taken were communists engaged in seditious talk or caught distributing propaganda tracts among the soldiers asking them to fraternize with the Riffians. Arrests were made at Marseilles, Toulouse and Montpellier.

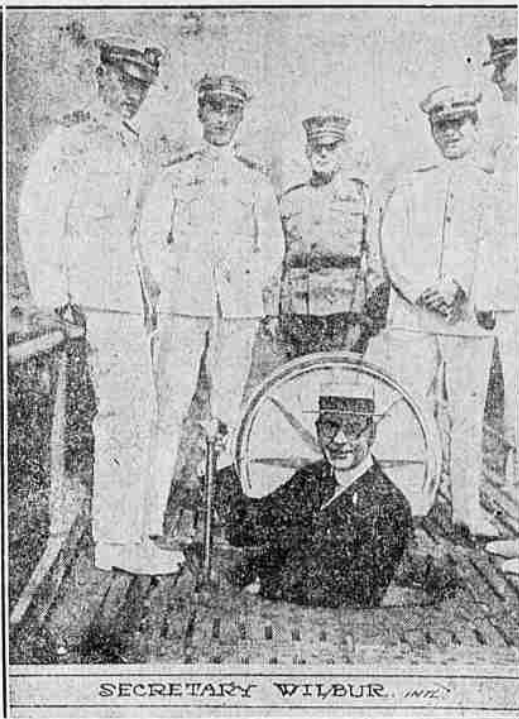
