

SENATORS FACE STIFF CONTEST AT HILLSBORO

The league-leading Salem Senators are to go to Hillsboro tomorrow afternoon in the interstate league series where they are to clash with the strong team there. The locals lost their first game of the season last week to the Luckenbach ship company, due to the stellar twirling of Rudy Kallio, ship-builder pitcher.

The two strong Canas and West Linn nines are to cross bats at Canas and the Luckenbach nine is to meet the Albany team at Albany. All of these games give promise of being hard fought. The Albany team, which entered the league for their initial appearance last week, has added considerable strength to the entire league.

The hardest fought game of the series tomorrow is the Salem-Hillsboro struggle. The Hillsboro team lost to the locals in an earlier meet but they are now all hopped up to find that it is possible to defeat the Senators. They are surely expecting to take the Senators into camp if they can. For that reason "Prince" Edwards, manager of the locals has urged all of the rooters that possibly can to attend the game.

A win for the Hillsboro nine would make the race a tight struggle. The locals would still be leading the league, with seven games won and two lost for a percentage of .775 while the Hillsboro nine would be close behind with a ten games won and three lost for a percentage of .769. The game will start at 2:30.

Edwards is planning on starting Barham on the mound for the locals. Barham has not been as effective in the last few games but has been working hard to get into shape and promises to send several of his opponents to the bench. Edwards will be behind the bat.

FRAUD LAID TO M'KELVIE AIDE

Lincoln, Neb., June 19.—(A.P.)—Criminal prosecution as well as civil suits to collect over-payments alleged to have been made road contractors during the republican administration of Governor Samuel McKelvie, under George Johnson, former commissioner of public works, will be started shortly in the state courts, Attorney General Spillman announced today.

A letter delivered to Spillman today from Johnson asks that the suits begin immediately. Johnson said he was anxious to have these matters cleared in order that he might then institute proceedings against former Governor Charles W. Bryan, whom he charges with "violation of the state corrupt practices act; violation of the state budget law and forcing a deficit so as to embarrass the previous state administration; violation of section 3350 of the compiled state statutes of 1923 for fraudulent use of the state revolving fund; for fraudulent use of funds received from the federal government and for fraudulent use of the federal malls in connection with his private coal company."

nation, there would be a serious question in the minds of many of them about inhibiting inheritance taxes, since this would lop off state revenues in excess of \$300,000 a year.

The terms of Justice T. A. Mc-Bride, H. J. Bean and George M. Brown of the supreme court will expire in January, 1927, so their successors will be elected next year. All three will be candidates to succeed themselves, and all doubtless will win at the polls.

Labor Office Vacant.
A labor commissioner is to be elected next year and C. H. Gram, incumbent, will again be a candidate. The term of T. K. Campbell as member of the public service commission will expire and it is understood Campbell wants the office again. He represents the state at large on the commission. Several candidates always seek the nomination; for labor commissioner and service commissioner in the primary elections.

Six circuit judges are to be elected next year for six-year terms. Those whose terms expire are: John H. Stevenson, fourth judicial district; A. C. Dickson, fourth district; J. W. Knowles, tenth district; D. R. Parker, 11th district; William M. Ramsey, 12th district, and J. M. Batchelder, 14th district.

Only three district attorneys are to be elected. Those whose terms expire are Fred McHenry of Benton county, Stanley Myers of Multnomah county and Max Wilson of Wallawa county.

15 Senators to Elect.
Fifteen state senators must be elected. Those who will not appear at the 1927 session of the legislature unless they are re-elected are: Sam H. Brown and A. M. LaFollette, of Marion county; J. S. Magliard, Lang county; Fred Fisk, Lane and Linn counties; George W. Dunn, Jackson county; A. J. Johnson, Benton and Polk counties; Peter Zimmerman, Yamhill county; F. J. Tooze, Clackamas county; Milton R. Kleppner, Multnomah county; W. J. H. Clark, Clackamas, Columbia and Multnomah counties; Mrs. W. S. Kinney, Clatsop county; H. J. Taylor, Morrow, Union and Umatilla counties; Roy W. Ritter, Umatilla county; and W. H. Strayer, Baker county.

A fight will be made against Senators Brown and LaFollette in Marion county, against Brown at least, for LaFollette is expected to remain voluntarily out of the race because of his advanced age. He is past 80. Garland of Linn has been appointed fish commissioner, but probably cannot hold that office for the reason that the state constitution seems to forbid members of the legislature serving in another remunerative state office or in a state administrative office. Should he be declared ineligible as fish commissioner he would be again available as state senator. He is one of the democratic members of the senate and would have to overcome republican opposition. Senator Plank is also a democrat in a republican strong hold and will have a strong opposition in the November election if he is nominated in May.

Zimmerman Opposed.
Peter Zimmerman will doubtless again be a candidate, for Zimmerman, although of mongrel politics, is a fighter and has many friends among the farmers. Though elected as a republican he has been close to the republican party and supported LaFollette for president. His opposition will come not only from his own county, but from other quarters in the state.

Senator Fred J. Tooze will be out of it. He has changed his residence from Clackamas to Marion county, having become editor of the Salem Statesman, and because of his short residence would not be looked upon as a proper candidate for Marion.

Senator W. J. H. Clark will not be back in the legislature, having accepted the superintendency of the adult school for the blind, a state institution in Portland.

Another democrat whose term expires is Taylor of Umatilla, not likely to run again because of his age. Senator Strayer of Baker, another democrat, will probably be a candidate if he doesn't run for the United States senate. All 60 members of the lower house of the legislature must be elected next year.

Like a sojourner from another planet, Mr. Holloway will bring the detachment not only of a mid-Western churchman but of an Englishman to his critical observation of the Hollywood scene. For Mr. Holloway was born at Shrewsbury on the Welsh border and after some years in governmental service in London came to this country in 1914. He completed his education at the University of Chicago and has since been in the ministry. He will soon take out his final papers for United States citizenship.

Though married and with three charming children, he declares that the winning of "The Skyrocket" Contest is the most exciting event of his life. He has never been to California, and in fact, has seen almost nothing of America.

Because he is more interested in life than in death and because he finds that novelists can tell him much about living, it is Mr. Holloway's custom to preach sermons upon popular novels and that is why his attention was called to "The Skyrocket"—"a book which is, in itself," he says, "as fine a sermon as one could wish to find."

ton have to run again as usual. W. C. Hawley in the first district, N. J. Sinnott in the second and Maurice Crumpacker in the third or Multnomah county district. The third district congressman always has plenty of opposition in the primaries, while Hawley and Sinnott sometimes have a sort of competition. The only thing that could take Sinnott out, or the contest would be his candidacy for the senate. There has been some American Legion opposition to Hawley, but this is not expected to develop much strength. Crumpacker, elected in 1924, has not yet yet in a congressional session, his active term not beginning until December.

Pierce Sure Candidate.
In the contest for the governorship next year Governor Pierce is certain to be without opposition in the Democratic primaries. Republicans said to covet the nomination are L. L. Patterson of Eola, State Senator Charles Hall of Marchfield, state Senator Jay Upton of Bend, State Senator Bruce Dennis of La Grande, C. E. Gates of Medford and possibly Secretary of State Sam A. Koser. Dennis talk is to the fore just now, due to the possibility of his running for governor on the basis of the Dennis resolution of the 1925 legislature, proposing a constitutional amendment barring income and inheritance taxes in Oregon for 15 years. This would be an issue of indefinite support. While a lot of voters might go with Dennis as far as state income tax elimi-
