A general influx of laborers into Salem is indicated by the report of the local employment bureau, operated by the Salem Y. M. C. A. States the employment service report, issued today and covering the past week, indicates that 265 men, approximately twice the normal number, applied for work here during the week. Of those who applied 117 were placed in jobs. The great majority of applicants were agricultural laborers. Two hundred and three men registered under that classification. In addition to that number, 16 registered as professional farm hands. Eight farm hands and 85 agricultural workers were given places. Out of 35 common laborers who applied for work in the city, 20 were successfully placed. Activity among woodmen took a slump during the week, none applying for work and no employer asking for help. Fifty-eight women applied for work in the county, and of the number 39 were successfully placed in jobs. A total of 49 women applied for work of one kind and another, and of the applicants 41 were placed. 147

## YALE COACHED TO 4 VICTORIES BY WESTERNERS

New London, Conn., June 20.—(By Associated Press)—Coached largely by men from points west, Yale has cleaned up Harvard in the four major sports events of the college year just ended. The victory of the Blue varsity eight on the Thames river yesterday in the 58th regatta of the historic series was the climax of tests of supremacy on gridiron, diamond and track. 147

The pupils of Ed Leader of Washington state again won on the water. It was Ted Jones of Ohio whose powerful football combination beat Harvard last fall and Kansas contributed Joe Wood to coach a winning nine. 147

Yesterday was the fifth consecutive time that Yale varsity oars had moved a shell faster than Harvard's and the count in the series is now Yale 31 victories, Harvard 27. 147

Both crews pulled four miles upstream on the Thames establishing records. While no official mark had ever been set previously for upstream, the best time made for 20 minutes, 52 seconds, and Yale skinned under that mark with a time of 20:26. 147

The Crimson blades trailed Yale by one and one half lengths in 20:32 2-5. The time was the fastest a Harvard crew had attained since 1916. 147

them in the alleged murder of his millionaire foster son, Billy McClintock. 147

Admits Possibility

Under a driving attack by Prosecutor Crowe, Dr. Tonney admitted that only a rule that germs should not be given out would stand between that act and its violation by an irresponsible employe, that at least one man in his department formerly attended Falman's school the National University of Sciences and that his department had propagated one set of germs for the last 30 years and would continue to do so for 30 more. 147

Crowe accused the witness of hedging in his response to interrogations and asked him if he had any interest in the trial, that maneuver by the state's attorney coming just five minutes before the time for the usual adjournment over Saturday afternoon and Sunday. 147

Weak Links Stressed

Dr. Tonney admitted that after newspaper published the confession of Falman in which he said he had obtained from the city health department laboratories three test tubes of typhoid germs which he passed on to Shepherd and taught him how to use in destroying Billy McClintock, two investigations of possible leaks at the laboratory were made by Dr. Herman Bundesen, head of the city health department, and Dr. Tonney. 147

The doctor also admitted that he understood that Falman's school had been licensed by Dr. Bundesen to conduct a hospital, a fact which would have influenced him in handing out germs from the laboratory. 147

The defense resumed its attack today upon the testimony of Miss Isabelle Pope, who waited with a marriage license while McClintock died of typhoid fever. 147

Frederick T. Knight, shorthand reporter, who recorded a portion of Miss Pope's testimony before the coroner's jury which held Shepherd for the murder of the rich youth, testified that the young woman had not mentioned "germs" or "study of germs." 147

On the witness stand against Shepherd who said the defendant had informed her he had studied "typhoid and germs." 147

## URGENT TOURISTS NOT TO ATTEMPT TRIP TO NIAGARA

Tourists are advised not to attempt trips on the new Detroit-Niagara highway this season by commissioners of the Marion county court who yesterday inspected the new highway in the interest of the court. Work is still being done on the road that will not be finished until the end of the summer and the road will have to remain closed most of the time, is their report. 147

Enthusiastic approval was given to the project for which Marion county has appropriated \$300,000 of the \$300,000 cost, when completed the road will be one of the finest scenic highways in this section, is their belief. The road is soon to be gravelled with an eight inch surface and the government is to open bids for this improvement on June 23. 147

The new road when finished is to open up a new better spot for pleasure tourists. Fishing is reported to be excellent in the district, and the town of Detroit is making every effort to attract visitors. The town is rapidly growing and it has recently added to its attractions a free auto camp ground. The distance from Salem to Detroit is 56 miles. At present the road to Gates is in first class condition with a good road from there to Niagara. From Niagara to Eador to Enn in the road is narrow and steep and passage is difficult even when permitted by the road supervisors. 147

In their inspection of the road they were accompanied by Mr. Dodson, resident engineer for the federal government, who took the party in his car. 147

of the Oregon Trunk into the Klamath Falls region would be the beginning of a new era for Oregon. 147

"It will be remembered that in 1810 the Oregon Trunk and Southern Pacific and the so-called Netron cutoff surveys were made simultaneously between Odell and Klamath lake in order to avoid so many physical conflicts on the route and it removed in the two lines being practically parallel throughout that district. We do not believe in having two parallel lines where one would do for both, therefore, even though both lines were surveyed at the same time and on a road nearing completion, we do not think it necessary to make a wasteful duplication." 147
