TIME SPENT IN JAIL NOT SAME AS FINE, RULING

Albany, Or., June 24.—Ivan Murphy, serving a jail sentence in lieu of payment of a \$500 fine, must serve his allotted time in the county jail or pay the entire fine, Judge Percy K. Kelly decided in the circuit court after hearing the arguments of Tob Garland, representing Murphy, and District Attorney L. C. Lewelling, representing Sheriff Richard, over a petition for a writ of habeas corpus for Murphy.

Judge Kelly, in denying the writ, ruled that the law makes provision for credit on a fine payment for time served by a prisoner in the county jail. Murphy alleged that he had served 99 1/2 days in jail, and should accordingly be given credit for \$199. He had offered at the end of the 99 1/2 days to pay \$301 of the fine. Sheriff Richard has refused to accept this part of payment of the fine, requiring, upon the advice of the district attorney, that Murphy pay all of the fine or serve the entire

DOG POISONING CASE TAKES ON VARIED ANGLES

West Salem, June 24.—The trial of Frank Einfeldt, who was arrested last week for poisoning two German police dogs belonging to George Aachenbrenner, has been set for next September.

One belief prevailing here is to the effect that the dogs died as a result of eating salmon scraps which Einfeldt fed to his chickens. Einfeldt is in the habit of bringing raw salmon scraps from Salmon and scattering them in his chicken yard. It is believed that the dogs, wandering from Aachenbrenner's property, located only a few yards away, picked up some of the scraps and died as a result. Einfeldt is quoted as denying emphatically that he placed any poison in the scraps, or in any other food for the dogs to eat. He intends to fight the lawsuit brought by Aachenbrenner, to a finish. The two men live 7 blocks west of the West Salem gravel plant. The situation is complicated by the fact that a captive coyote, owned by a West Salem resident, broke loose last week, and is thought to have killed a number of chickens. The claim advanced is that it was the coyote, not Aachenbrenner's dogs, that killed Einfeldt's chickens.

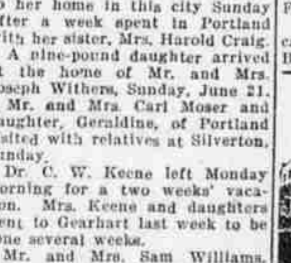
