Floral Show Yesterday Success

The Garden club of Salem sponsored their second successful floral show in the armory yesterday, closing with a children's parade in which eleven youngsters were entered. The first prize was won by Master Merlyn Gunnell who was dressed in a full dress suit with a silk hat. Very small Jenette Maxwell in a befrilled yellow organza carrying a large basket of marigolds was the ribbon winner. All of the entrants were awarded prizes.

The floral exhibits were complete and for the most part beautifully arranged. Especially interesting to many of the spectators yesterday was the remarkable collection of wild flowers which Mrs. S. H. Van Trump and Miss Margaret Nunn exhibited. Each collection filled one table and the color and harmony arrangement was beautiful. No two dozen varieties of wild flowers in bloom in the woods and along the fences at this time of the year were included. One of the most interesting features of the show was the display of regal lilies made by Dr. J. J. Fairchild. More than thirty of the blooms were placed in a large vase. They are a new variety and extremely beautiful.

A remarkable collection of lilies exhibited by Miss Sally Bush and Mrs. William McGilchrist, Jr., large basket of blooms on a pedestal received much favorable comment. Breitaupt's florist shop arranged a beautiful collection on the stage.

The awards were as follows: Class 1. Table decorations. First prize of \$3 to Mrs. C. A. Kells for a brass bowl of cerise sweet peas, azure delphinium, maidenhair fern, hukera, roses and candytuft. Class 2. Best arrangement of short stemmed flowers. First prize of \$3 to Miss Lilla McMunn, for a green pottery bowl of yellow and purple pansies; second prize of \$1 to Mrs. C. A. Kells for larkspur in an art glass bowl.

Class 3. Best arrangement of hardy perennial cut flowers. First prize of \$5 to Mrs. M. N. Chapman for a green-leaved basket of nasturba, Iceland poppies, delphinium, coreopsis, aprina, lychnia and Michelmas daisies; second prize of \$2 to Mrs. C. A. Kells for a bowl of violet, coreopsis, harebells, delphinium, sweet william and fox glove.

Class 4. Best arrangement of flowers in basket. First prize of \$3 to Mrs. Harrison McWhorter for larkspur, huca of pink and rose with lavender Michelmas daisies and spruce foliage; second prize of \$1 to Mrs. W. W. Rosebraugh for purple Canterbury bells with Queen Anne's lace.

Class 5. Best collection of wild flowers. First prize of \$5 to Mrs. S. H. Van Trump and second prize of \$2 to Miss Margaret Nunn, each exhibiting a complete table of blossoms.

Class 6. Best collection of sweet peas. First prize of \$5 to Mrs. J. A. Bishop and second prize of \$2 to Mrs. B. H. White.

Class 7. Best exhibit of unusual varieties. First prize of \$3 to Mrs. W. W. Rosebraugh.
