Club Civic Committee At Work

The civic committee of the Salem Women's club decided at a meeting with the club president, Mrs. W. F. Fargo in the city library on Tuesday afternoon, to commence immediately with a survey of the standard of living maintained by the American born and the foreign born in Salem. This will be done by means of a questionnaire sent out by Mrs. John D. Sherman, president of the general federation of women's clubs in Washington, D. C., to all of the federated clubs in the United States. It is accompanied by a letter of approval from President Coolidge. The questionnaire contained in the returned questionnaires from all of the clubs in the nation will be compiled, condensed and interpreted in an article which will appear in the Woman's Home Companion.

The civic committee in charge of the work in Salem includes Mrs. A. M. Chapman, chairman, Mrs. U. G. Boyer, Mrs. Winifred Getty, Mrs. L. O. Clement, Mrs. Ronald Glover and Miss Ethel Fletcher. This group will gather the material from the city health department, the chamber of commerce, the electric and water power companies, the firms that sell groceries and supplies, victrolas and general musical supplies. In addition to compilation for the Woman's Home Companion article the questionnaires will be used in an attempt to influence legislation regarding census taking so that the official census will contain information regarding the standard of living of the American born and the foreign born in this country.

The two federated clubs in Salem, the Salem Women's club and the Elks club, are uniting in the work which Mrs. Sherman has requested all the clubs to do. There are in all one hundred and sixty five clubs in Oregon affiliated with the central organization. It is expected that some extremely valuable material will be uncovered in the survey which is being conducted by club women all through the country.

The local club plans to complete its survey within three weeks.

BRITISH DESIRE TO LIMIT PACT

London, June 25.—Foreign Secretary Chamberlain told the house of commons today that Great Britain's obligations under the proposed western European security pact "must be definitely limited to the frontier between Germany on the one side and France and Belgium on the other." He added that "our guarantees of that frontier cannot be invoked by a wrongdoer to shield him in his wrongdoing."

He said the abstention of the British empire, and of Great Britain in particular, from European affairs never had served and never would serve the interests of peace. Great Britain's signature to the covenant to the league of nations, incompatible with isolation.
