

### ESCAPED CON IS SEEN BUT SHOTS FAIL TO HALT HIM

Tacoma, Wash., June 26.—Suddenly coming face to face with Boston firemen, the escaped federal penitentiary convict who was seen from the island for three days, Guard Elmer V. Hill fired a fusillade of bullets at him early yesterday morning, but Hanson took a long chance and escaped to the brush again.

Guard Hillon was entering the machine shop about 1 o'clock in the morning. Just as he came in from one side Hanson entered the shop from the other.

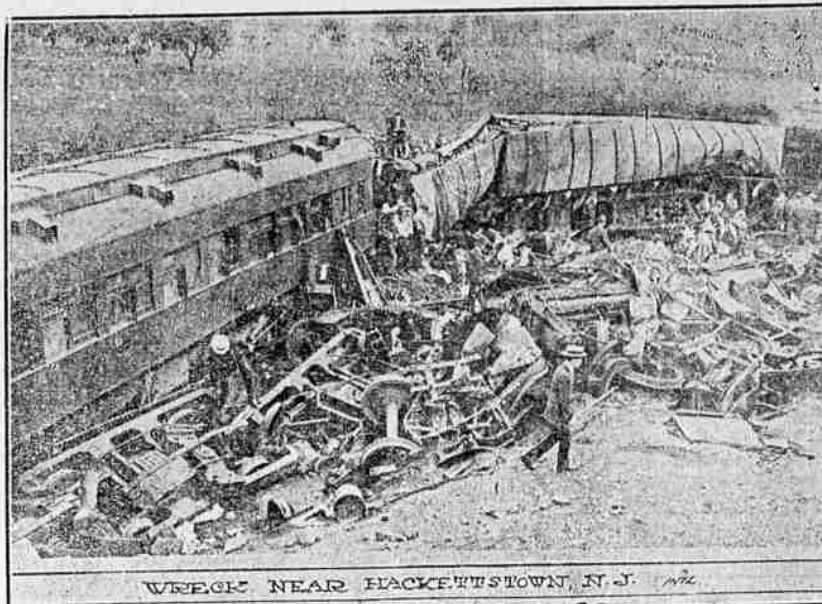
"Throw up your hands and don't try to get away, or I'll shoot you," said Hillon.

Hanson quickly raised his hands as if in submission and then took a chance and ran to a lock on the door through which he himself entered he lunged back, pushed the door open and plunged outside.

As the door was swinging shut back of the prisoner, Hillon fired three times. Hillon rushed outside to see the prisoner just disappearing over the top of a hill back of the shop. He let two more shots fly at him, but they evidently did no damage.

Hanson was seen for the last time as he disappeared in the brush. Patrolling of the island is still going on to prevent him escaping.

### SHEFFIELD MAY QUIT AS ENVOY

New York, June 25.—Coinciding with the entrance of Joseph R. Sheffield into a hospital here came reports that he would not return to Mexico as United States ambassador.

Mexican reports that he would not return have been denied authoritatively at Washington.

New statements in the matter were in the form of dispatches to officials at border points, signed by the government chief of publicity at Mexico City. These dispatches said it was assured in diplomatic circles that Mr. Sheffield would not return and that he would ask that George L. Sumner be appointed in his place.

In contrast with these messages are dispatches from Washington that not only Mr. Sheffield go to treatment of Americans and American property, the subject of recent statements by Secretary Kellogg and President Calles.

### EASTERN SPORT WRITER PRAISES RIDING OF SANDE

Concerning the riding of Earle Sande of Salem, premier American jockey, George Daley in the New York World of June 20 says:

"Earl Sande enjoyed another rousing ovation at the Aqueduct track yesterday, when he rode Danby to victory over Florence Nightingale, Peanuts, Swope and Flatship in the Hanover handicap for three-year-olds.

"The popularity of this clever jockey grows and grows. Not even Babe Ruth has more boosters or more ardent admirers. The noise and excitement at the finish and when the boy jogged his mount back to the scales has not been equaled over the running of any turf classic this year with the exception of the Kentucky derby and the Suburban handicap.

"The applause was deserved. Sande rode a perfect race—smooth, well-judged and capable. Placing his mount just off the pace forced by Florence Nightingale, winner of the Coaching Club American Oaks, he skinned the rail all around the turn, moved up slowly but surely when straightened out in the stretch and rode a strong smooth finish to win by three parts of a length.

"Danby took up 119 pounds and ran the mile in the good time of 1:37 4-5, a thoroughly fine performance."

Mayor Quinn of Cambridge was accorded the honor today of being the first to have a conference with the president, his call being arranged to discuss plans for the reception of Mr. Coolidge when he comes to Cambridge July 3 for an address.

Mr. Coolidge is still undecided whether he will go to Poland Springs, Maine, next week to participate in the conference of governors. If he does not, it is believed the governors will come to White Court to be received by him.

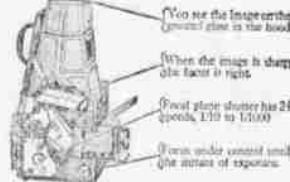
