Colonel (Rev.) George Fallis, who will speak at Chautauqu on "The Problem of World Peace," is particularly fitted to handle this important subject well, as he has first-hand knowledge of conditions in Europe and is a deep student of international affairs. Colonel Fallis was a chaplain in the World war. He came face to face with all the horrors of battle, went into the trenches with the boys, studied people of different nationalities and emperment. Canada Colonel Fallis went on extensive tours, appearing on the platform with many of the world's most prominent men. Through his personal efforts the Canadian Memorial church at Vancouver, B. C., was built. He is now pastor of that church, prominently connected with educational institutions, Reformer officer, and leader in all progressive civic movements. Although minister and one of the outstanding orators of Canada, Colonel Fallis is a devoted sportsman, being vice president of the Vancouver tennis club, one of the foremost in the Dominion. He will have an impressive message for Chautauquans—the world peace problem.
