

### DARROW NOT TO APPEAR BEFORE TENNESSEE BAR

Dayton, Tenn., June 26.—Withdrawal of an invitation to Clarence Darrow to address the Tennessee Bar Association at Memphis today because his presence "might be misconstrued" and a statement by Bainbridge Taylor expressing surprise at the "holiday atmosphere" surrounding the approaching evolution trial were high lights in an otherwise dull period of preparation for the court battle.

Mr. Darrow, Mr. Colby and other attorneys for the defense of J. T. Scopes indicted science teacher, has just concluded conference in Knoxville. Mr. Darrow departed for Chicago and the former secretary of state for New York, while Dudley Field Malone returned to Dayton, stopping off in Chattanooga long enough to give a public statement of his views in trial drama.

Mr. Colby, whose statement was issued in behalf of all members of the defense staff, called "the shocking and abnormal character of the legislation" involved an one of "the most serious questions which could possibly arise to challenge the ability of the citizenship to national self government."

Mr. Malone declared he had no difficulty in holding with devotion to Christianity and also to evolution.

"I have come to Tennessee to intervene in this case in behalf of young men and young women who are entitled in all public institutions to be taught the truth and the whole truth," he said.

The country is suffering from "good people, who in their ignorance feel ordained to save the cost of us who stand in no need of their ideal of salvation," Mr. Malone said.

He added that he "believed an expose of Mr. Bryan and the psychology of people of that type" would help to clear the air "for straight thinking."

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### HANDS, FEET AND CHIN OF GASSED HERO OSSIFYING

Omaha, Neb., June 26.—One of the strangest disabilities reported at the convention of Disabled American Veterans here is that of Peter Barick, 38 years old of Minneapolis, whose hands, feet and chin apparently are ossifying and have already lost much of their feeling.

Doctors have given his case up and he is listed as a "permanent total disability."

Barick's condition came from mustard gas entering open sores caused by a freezing of his hands and feet and face. He stood guard 48 hours in a front trench with those members frozen and after 16 days in a hospital, returned to the front, was downed by a bullet in a charge and suffered the same dose. He has spent most of the time since in a hospital, and now is on leave from the Aberdeen hospital at Minneapolis.

### ALLOCATION OF FUEL COSTS IS AGAIN CHANGED

On grounds that the method of the Northwestern Electric company is allocating fuel costs at Pittock station between electric and steam utilities is unjust and discriminatory, the public service commission today issued an order readjusting the allocation.

Relative to station losses the order requires the company to assign the station losses as nearly as possible on the heat unit basis, charging each utility with the heat, or equivalent pounds of live steam, required or justly chargeable to such utility.

Relative to steam used for generating electricity, exclusive of station losses, the order requires the company to assign fuel costs, exclusive of station losses, to electric operation on the basis of the economic value of the electric energy produced at Pittock, charging 18,000 British thermal units to each kilowatt hour generated, and assigning the balance of the fuel cost to the steam heating service.

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### CRASH IS FATAL TO ARMY FLYER

Mitchel Field, N. Y., June 26.—Jerome Douglas E. Logan, of the United States Army air service was killed at Mitchel Field today when a piece of a propeller broke in the fall of a Martin bomber in which he was riding, tore through the fuselage and pierced his heart. He has relatives in Blaine, Ark.

The bomber, piloted by Lieutenant J. A. Wilson, was undergoing a trial flight, being just out of its engineering shop. Twenty feet from the ground a gust of wind tilted the plane and it fell, breaking a propeller and stripping the undercarriage.

With terrific force, a piece of the propeller flew out and ripped through the forward cockpit in which Logan was riding.

### MAYOR HYLAN AGAIN SEEKS RE-ELECTION

have been caused by efforts of republicans and fanatics to twist the tail of the Tammany bull.

This time, if that feat is to be accomplished, it may be by one of the same political faith—Mayor John F. Hylan.

The mayor who has held office for eight years, is desirous of another term. Whether he will be renominated by the democratic party is a question the Tammany chieftains have not yet officially decided, but if he does not get the regular nomination he is expected to run independently.

The possibility of the mayor running independently is agitating the Tammany brass. The managers of the Wigwam are practically politicians with an eye to the patronage at stake. The mayor of New York rules an empire and these politicians are not losing sight of the fact that the metropolis has many thousands of employes whose payroll runs up in the millions.

This week the mayor sprung a coup by calling in departmental heads and inviting those who were

not for him to remove their feet from under the Hylan patronage table. While the meeting was not public, it was announced those present, including eight Tammany leaders, had endorsed his proposed nomination by "acclamation."

This aroused the ire of Comptroller Charles L. Craig, a Tammany man, but a bitter foe of the mayor who countered with a letter to the district attorney, the governor, calling for the mayor's removal from office on the ground that he violated the penal code providing against "concurrent use of a position or authority."

So far scarcely a man has mentioned seriously for the republican nomination.

The G. O. P. leaders say they are

enjoying the row within the Wigwam and hoping for a wide split that will allow a republican to win in a democratic stronghold.

The political forecast is: warmer.
