SENATORS TAKE THIRD WIN FROM CAMAS, SCORE 5-4

The Salem Senators maintained their winning streak when they defeated Camas on the Oxford park diamond yesterday afternoon by a score of 5 to 4. This is the third defeat of the season at the hands of the locals. The first game ended 4 to 2 in favor of the locals and the last two by the same score of 5 to 4.

Ashey, for the locals, pitched exceptionally good ball until the eighth inning when the Camas team came from behind and took the lead by scoring four runs on four hits and a walk. In their half of the eighth the locals came back and won the game by scoring two runs on two walks and an error by Gabarino. Barham went in to pitch for the Senators in the last inning when Coleman went into bat for Ashey in the eighth.

Take Lead in First

The Senators scored one run in the first frame when Bouton, first man up was safe on Oestenson's error. Maples walked and Bouton went to second. Proctor sacrificed Bouton and Maples and was safe when Tidland dropped the ball, filling the bases with no out. Steers sent a sacrifice fly to out. Jones scored. Keene, James and Rinehart hit a hard one to Gribble who threw him out at first.

The visitors came near scoring in their half of the second when they filled the bases with no out. Tidland got a hit and went to second when Ashey muffed Gribble's fly and both of them were safe. The locals scored another tally in the fourth inning. Rinehart was safe on Gribble's error. Barr and Edwards swung at three and missed all of them. Ashey got a walk. Bouton got a hit and Rinehart scored. Maples fanned.

In the seventh the locals added another run when Steers scored. Maples, first man up attempted to bunt but was thrown out at first. Proctor got a hit. Steers hit a fly ball to right field which Blair muffed and Steers was safe. Proctor being forced out at second. Steers stole second. Keene hit a double over first and Steers crossed the plate. Rinehart fanned.

The eighth inning was a hectic affair for both sides.

OLD SILVERTON BRIDGE CLOSED

Silverton, June 29.—The old wooden bridge over Silver creek on north Water street was closed to traffic after it broke Friday night when a large truck attempted to cross it. The truck, owned by Albert Webb who conducts the Pacific Transfer business, was driven by Arthur Dill and carried a four ton load. As the truck passed over the bridge worn planking gave way and only a heavy rail which caught and held the rear end of the truck prevented its falling into the creek.

The broken bridge was formerly of the covered type and was built in 1892. Except for fords it was for many years the only means of crossing Silver creek. About twelve or fifteen years ago when the streets of Silverton were paved it was moved from its original location on Main street to its present place. With the exception of the time it was moved, it has been in use constantly since it was built.

The question of repairs or replacement with another bridge will be discussed by the city council when it meets Monday night.

ANNUAL SHORT COURSE FOR SECRETARIES SET

University of Oregon, Eugene, June 29.—(Special).—The fifth annual short course for commercial secretaries will be held at the University of Oregon, July 5 to 19. It was announced today by E. C. Robbins, dean of the school of business administration. A more comprehensive program, with a feature, "directors' day," has been arranged for the week. J. H. Fuller of Ashland, president of the state association of commercial secretaries, which with the school of business administration is sponsoring the meetings, will attend for the fifth time and be reported that the enrollment is expected to be heavy.

Instruction in technique of chamber of commerce work will be one of the outstanding features this year. This will be held by E. D. Tagie, managing secretary of the chamber of commerce of Walla Walla, Wash. Mr. Tagie is president of the Washington association of commercial organization secretaries and has had considerable experience in many lines of secretarial work.

L. E. Vinling, president of the state chamber of commerce, will be present to discuss important state problems, as will W. B. D. Dodson, manager, Portland chamber of commerce, and W. G. Ide, secretary of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce.

STEINER GIVEN PAY INCREASE

Out of consideration of the fact that Dr. R. E. Leo Steiner, superintendent of the state hospital for the insane in Salem and Dr. W. B. McNary, superintendent of the state hospital for the insane at Pendleton, use their own automobiles and not state-owned cars, the state board of control Saturday voted to increase their salaries from \$3000 to \$4000 a year.

Governor Fiske, Secretary of State Koser and State Treasurer Kay, who comprise the board, were all present and the vote was unanimous. Kay made the motion and it was seconded by Koser.
