

REFERENDUM ON PROHIBITION AIM OF WORKER

As part of an attempt to revive prohibition as a political issue, J. A. Danielson has arrived in Salem as a representative of the Prohibition Repeal Association, Inc.

Up to the present two things have been done in his campaign to repeal the present national prohibition act: Circulation of petitions among Oregon voters favoring repeal of the Eighteenth amendment to the federal constitution and the Volstead act, and the holding of a meeting at the Central library in Portland Wednesday evening, June 17, at which "The Whys of Prohibition Failure" was the subject discussed. Fifty petitions will be left in Salem today.

Petitions Distributed

Mr. Danielson came here from Seattle and Tacoma, where he carried on a similar campaign. Petition blanks have been left at principal hotels, cigar stores, banks, offices and other public places, with the standing invitation that all persons opposed to present prohibition arrangements sign the petitions. Mr. Danielson is making his headquarters at the Imperial hotel, Portland.

The Federal Prohibition Repeal Association, Inc., is connected with a national organization having headquarters in Washington, called the Association Against the Eighteenth Amendment.

Referendum Asked

The petition which voters are asked to sign reads as follows:

"Whereas, we believe that the 18th amendment and the Volstead act have been the cause of increase in crime and drug addicts, we, the undersigned, members of the Federal Prohibition Repeal Association, Inc., hereby petition the congress of the United States of America to pass a resolution permitting the people to express themselves through a national referendum, if they wish to continue the present policy or modify the laws so as to permit the manufacture and sale of light wines and beer and other liquors under government supervision and distribution."

Signing the petition automatically enrolls the signer as a member of the Federal Prohibition Repeal Association, but involves no further obligation, except the expression of an opinion.

Work now being done is preliminary to having a nation-wide referendum as soon as congress passes the resolution ordering such a vote to ascertain what the real sentiment of the people is concerning prohibition.

Key Points Visited

Circulating the petitions will be done in 45 representative cities

which are key-points in the control of congress. As soon as a majority of congress, particularly of the house of representatives, is favorable to a referendum an election will be ordered held, according to plans now outlined.

Over 10,000 signatures have already been obtained in Seattle and Tacoma. Between 25,000 and 30,000 signers are expected to attach their names to the petition in Portland in the next four weeks, during which time Mr. Danielson will be active in Oregon.

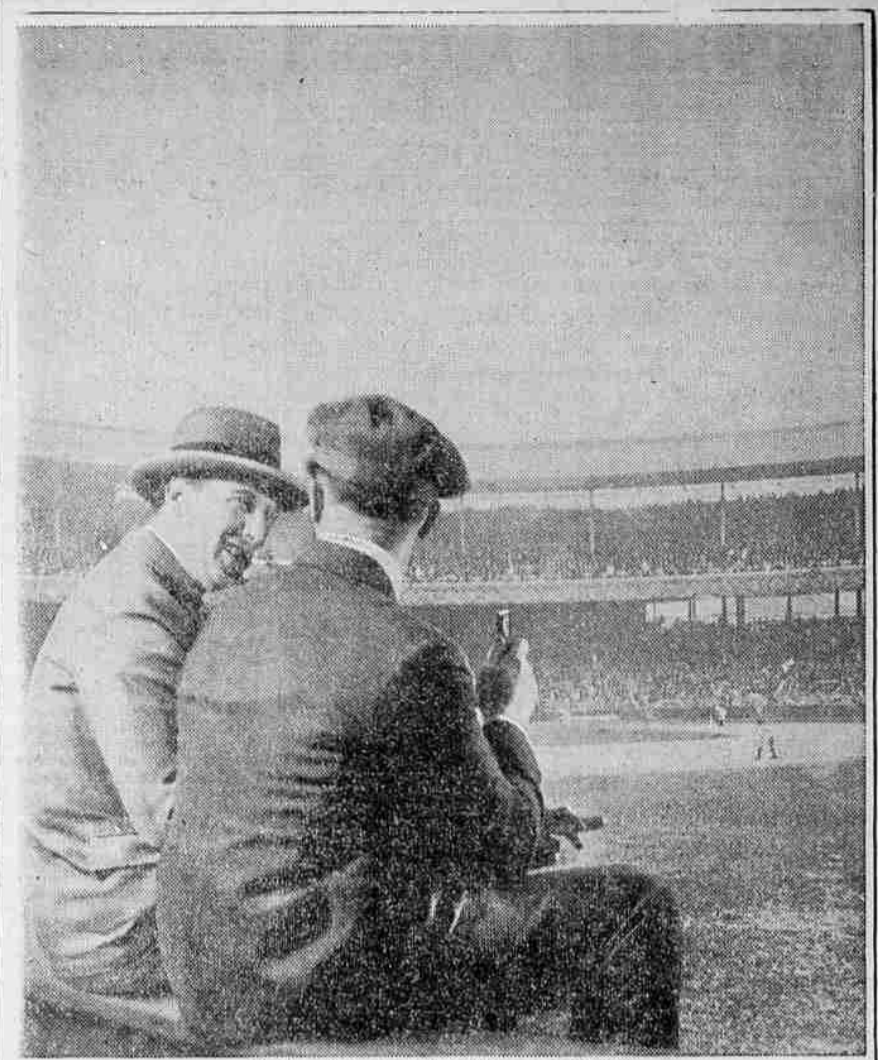
