

BISHOP HURLING IN GREAT SHAPE ON EASTERN CLUB

Word from Albert "Biddy" Bishop, former manager of the Salem Senators, was received lately by George J. Jones. Bishop is playing great ball according to papers sent with the letter. Bishop was manager of the Senators last year but left early this spring for Bedford, Indiana, to coach the high school team there and to play ball during the week.

He played with the Danville club of the Three I League for a month and a half but was released later for no reason, according to Biddy. He was playing good ball but the club was losing and he was released. From there Bishop went to the Fairbault club of the South Minnesota League.

Bishop says that he has a better position at Fairbault than at Danville and thinks the move was for the best. "We are all well and have a cottage on Lake Umbagog, a large summer resort about five miles from Fairbault where we go nearly every day," says Bishop. "Biddy" has been getting the Capital Journal most of the time and is fairly well versed on the performances of the locals in all of their games. He has been moving around so much, however, that he has lost out on the last few games.

"This is the place to play ball. You can see by the papers that the town is baseball mad," and "they pay real money and sure support the team," says Bishop. "The best business men of the town are the directors and they raise enough money to pull the club through in two hours. The town is only half as big as Salem but they draw \$500 crowds on week days."

"We played ball at Rochester, Minnesota, the home of the famous Mayo brothers yesterday. The town is sure a busy place, with 25 hotels, all big ones and they are all full at the present time."
