## DAYTON MAKES PREPARATIONS TO HOUSE CROWD

Dayton, Tenn., June 30.—(By Associated Press)—While defense attorneys in northern cities worked on the legal phase of the Scopes education case and other persons debated its educational significance, Dayton went ahead today making plans to meet the thousands of expected to attend the trial of the Tennessee school teacher here beginning July 10.

A big house on a hill is being prepared for the residence of attorneys who will come from many places to defend John T. Scopes against the charge that he taught evolution in a public school. This commodious dwelling of 18 rooms may be used also to care for expert witnesses, of whom a score or more are looked for.

Engineers from New Orleans were surveying the situation today with a view of erecting a huge auditorium. Plans for proposed amplifiers would convey to the overflow through the details of the legal battle.

Dr. John R. Neal, chief counsel for Mr. Scopes was in New York today, presumably to confer with witnesses for the accused man.

In Chicago where he conferred yesterday with Clarence Darrow and Dudley Field Malone, his associates in the case, Dr. Neal expressed himself as seeing a broad significance in the movement behind the coming trial.

"This case has more than local significance," the defender of the teacher is quoted. "One is amazed at the extent of latent sentiment of intolerance and bigotry in other states."

The state's charges against Scopes are sustained who will see other evolution trials and perhaps a movement in congress to control the thought as well as the actions of the people."

## SEARCH AND SEIZURE IS HELD LEGAL

stant case the defendant was legally arrested and searched, and the evidence of his crime was admissible in court. In holding the search and seizure lawful, but since the ruling favored the defendant he is in no position to complain. The evidence that was admitted was sufficient to establish the charge in the indictment.

While the lower court held the search and seizure unlawful, it allowed the evidence so obtained to be used in the trial.

Further opinion says:

"Need Not Arrest First."

"It is argued that the arrest followed, and did not precede the search. In our opinion it is immaterial whether the arrest preceded or followed the search if such acts were practically simultaneous, and if, in fact, the defendant was guilty of committing a crime in the presence of the officers for which he might have been arrested, in many instances it is dangerous for an officer to go through the formality of stating that the accused is under arrest, and the law does not require him to do so. It is often-times safer to act first and talk afterward."

"It is neither necessary nor essential to a decision of this case," the opinion says further. "It passes on the question as to whether evidence illegally obtained is admissible."
