

RESTRICTION OF IMMIGRATION DECLARED GOOD

New York, July 1.—(A. P.)—"A most desirable effect of Uncle Sam's new immigration policy has been its gift to the American people of an opportunity to get acquainted."

At 12:01 a. m. occurred the second birthday of that statute, with its radically restrictive quota provisions and other features new in the history of American effort to control the great flow of immigration.

The quietness in the executive wing of the immigration headquarters in Ellis Island typified the situation throughout the broad flung buildings. The landing stage was empty and a scant half score anxious relatives held seats where formerly surged stifling crowds.

A marked improvement in quality of immigrants was the chief effect noted by Mr. Curran in the flow through Ellis Island, which handles half of the 1900 day admittances authorized under the existing quota.

FRENCH READY TO NEGOTIATE SOON

Paris, July 1.—(A. P.)—It is understood that the French government is soon to inform the United States of its desire to open negotiations in Washington for settlement of the French debt.

Instructions to this effect may be sent by Foreign Minister Briand shortly to M. Daeschner, the French ambassador in Washington.

The advisers to the foreign minister do not appear to have reached their conclusions as yet, but it is recognized that both the American and British debts must be arranged as part of the French government's program to stabilize the country's finances this autumn.

New Orleans, La.—"Well, what have you to say for yourself?" said Judge Emil Leonard rather severely when Benjamin Halpern, a jeweler, was brought before him recently, charged with "disturbing the peace."

"Well, you see it's like this, judge," replied Halpern, and to the police court judge's surprise he drew forth a silver loving cup, made a neat speech and presented it to his honor.

The cup was given by a group of Judge Leonard's friends to commemorate his reelection, and Halpern explained that the charge of "disturbing the peace" was framed up to facilitate the novel presentation. Judge Leonard thanked the donors and did not forget to add, "case dismissed."

YEAR OF 13 MONTHS ADVANCED BY LEAGUE

London, Eng.—The railways of Great Britain have signified approval of a questionnaire issued by the league of nations, through the International Union of Railways, for the adoption of a year of thirteen 28-day months. It was announced here recently. The alteration would involve a fixed Easter and an extra "year day" would make up the total of 365 days of the calendar. A "leap day" is also provided.

LONGEST RAIL TUNNEL IS WASHINGTON'S AIM

Seattle, Wash.—Citizens of Washington, led by Judge Austin E. Griffiths of this city, have formed the Cascade Tunnel association to effect, with national, state and railroad financing, the boring of a tunnel 30 miles long linking the eastern and western halves of their commonwealth. It would be the longest tunnel in the world.

LABOR CRISES THREATENING COAL INDUSTRY

New York, July 1.—Serious labor crises threaten the coal mining industries of both the United States and Great Britain.

John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers of America, has publicly denounced the "infamous conspiracy" in the bituminous fields to break the miners' union, declaring that unless the existing Jacksonville agreement is carried out, a national shutdown of soft coal mines may be ordered.

In England a big strike threatens following formal notification by the mine owners of their intention to terminate the present agreement—a move which Secretary Cook, of the miners' federation, characterizes as a "declaration of war."

Mr. Lewis statement, made in an address yesterday before the anthracite tri-district scale convention at Scranton was featured by an attack on John D. Rockefeller Jr., Charles M. Schwab and Secretary of the Treasury Andrew W. Mellon.

Paraphrasing to draw a "contrast" between the "private and business morals" of these men, the miners' chief alleged they had failed to use their influence as stockholders in large soft coal companies to prevent repudiation of the Jacksonville agreement.

CHILDREN OF MEXICO ARE TAUGHT THRIFT

Mexico City.—Under a presidential decree just published the department of public instruction is authorized to found a savings and loan bank for school children.

School teachers must deposit in this institutions one day's salary in each month with 31 days, but pupils savings are voluntary, although they must not be less than five centavos a week. The bank's operations will be limited to making loans to co-operative bodies. It is estimated that savings will total 120,000 pesos a year.

DELINQUENT CHILDREN NUMEROUS IN TOKYO

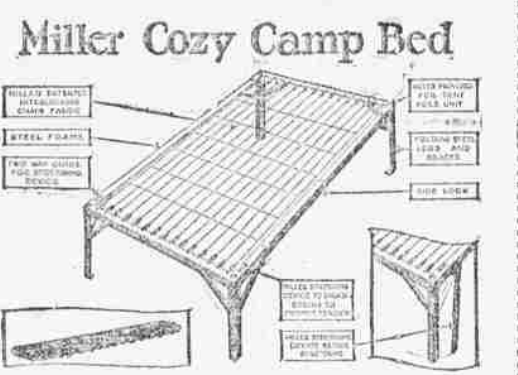
Tokyo, Japan.—A campaign for the reform of "furyo seinen," a term used to designate Japanese boys and girls of criminal tendencies, is to be undertaken by the metropolitan police department. The police at present have a special staff which deals with incorrigible youngsters, but its numbers will be doubled in a determined effort to weed out the embryonic criminals of Tokyo.

Today there are between 5000 and 6000 youths of both sexes on the special staff's black list. These include college students, school children, factory workers and homeless waifs. The college students will receive special attention from the police, who declare they have received many complaints that the young men have been frequenting the cafes of Tokyo at unreasonably late hours.

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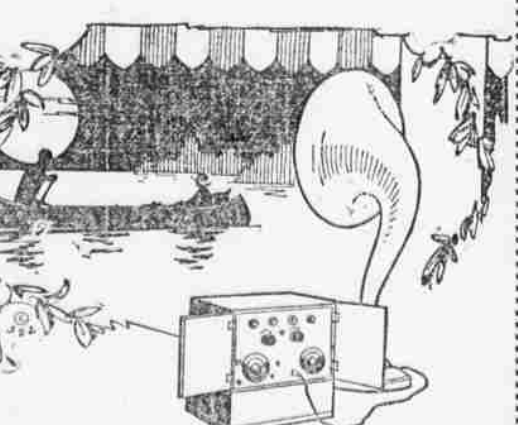
