400 MARINES WILL PATROL RUINED CITY

The system suffered only nominal damage in Monday's earth shock. One small storage reservoir and a few lesser mains were injured, but the city's major source of supply, a huge artificial lake behind Gibraltar dam on the Santa Ynez river, was unharmed, Nunn said, after an official survey. Ten people lost their lives in the earthquake, described as the heaviest to visit the Pacific coast. Five major shocks have been recorded since the first tremor on Monday, but throughout the time there have been slight, almost imperceptible shocks of nearly a score.

Witness Tells Story. No exact estimate of the loss has been announced, but it has been described between \$20,000,000 and \$25,000,000. A graphic eye witness account of the antics of the earthquake in the mountain regions was brought to Santa Barbara last night by J. M. McAvoy, owner of a quicksilver mine on the Santa Ynez river.

"We were at breakfast when the first shake occurred," he said. "Our table seemed lifted from the floor, nearly turning a somersault and scrambling the breakfast on the floor. The floor seemed tilted at an angle of 25 degrees and then swung like a pendulum back in the opposite direction. We rushed, or rather staggered, from the house and some of my companions were thrown to the hands and knees by the impact of the shock. As I looked out across the range of mountains, they swayed perceptibly. A great dust cloud was thrown up by the agitation, accompanied by a deep rumbling roar, almost sickening in its intensity."

have been several that caused injured persons to be sent to hospitals, while a considerable number of cars have been badly wrecked. The list accounts for all of the accidents that have happened within the city limits and some that have taken place on the highways near Salem, but of the latter some have been reported to police officers in other towns and cities.

Most of the accidents are simple collisions that could be avoided by careful driving. These mainly happen at street intersections. Defective brakes have been a frequent cause of mishaps. Another cause often noted on the records is the mistake made by some motor vehicle owners of allowing their cars to stand on streets or highways at night without lights.

Several accidents have been caused by drunken drivers, one of the most serious being caused by a house.

Children have a bad habit of crossing the streets carelessly without first looking to see if the way is clear, and several youngsters have been knocked down. Fortunately none has been seriously hurt.

Defective brakes were the cause of a collision between automobiles driven by J. Breasler of route 3 and E. J. Wolty of Pratum at Commercial and Ferry streets.

Cars driven by Richard Knisel, 250 South 14th street, and Thomas M. Curry, route 2, collided at State and Liberty.

DOHENY SAYS NAVAL LEASE PATRIOTIC

which the latter wrote that the issue had been obtained from Edward B. McLean, publisher of the Washington Post.

Fall Signed Letter. The Times states it has learned that a prominent member of the republican national committee in 1920 brought the letter to Mr. Fall in its completed form and urged the secretary to sign it. Mr. Fall strongly demurred, the newspaper says, but the committee emphasized that an election was coming and those who conceived the idea of having Mr. McLean pose as the leader of the \$100,000,000 thought that the letter and made public before the senate committee would clear the political atmosphere.

Mr. Fall, the newspaper asserts, signed the letter, but not mailing it, he returned it to the man who brought it to him. A few hours later it was in the hands of Senator Lenroot, chairman of the senate investigating committee and shortly thereafter it was read into the records of the committee and given to the press. Counsel for Mr. Doheny declare that the McLean letter episode is the one incident in his long friendship with Mr. Fall that Mr. Doheny cannot excuse.

In the interview Mr. Doheny charged that telegrams had disappeared mysteriously from the files of the interior department after the files of the department had been ransacked by persons in the employ of the senate investigating committee. He said these telegrams would have disclosed that these contracts were supervised by Assistant Secretary of the Interior Finney, Secretary Denby and Admiral Robinson.

Mr. Doheny read the telegrams during the seven-hour interview. He said they had been unscrupulously by his counsel in the office of the controller general attached to bills for the telegraph tolls.
