The fact that no bid had been received from Mr. Ford on Tuesday when they were opened by the board, occasioned some surprise.

Mr. Ford did not announce the amount he had offered for the vessels nor did he give any indication of the specification of his bid.

Not Received
Washington, July 2—Fleet corporation officials said today the bid of Henry Ford for the 200 ship ping board vessels set aside for scrapping, had not been received by them and when it arrives it can not be considered unless new bids are invited.

Many bids were opened at noon Tuesday when the time for receiving them ended and it is expected that the fleet corporation will submit recommendations to the shipping board at its regular meeting July 7. If the board should reject all the offers, new bids would be asked.
