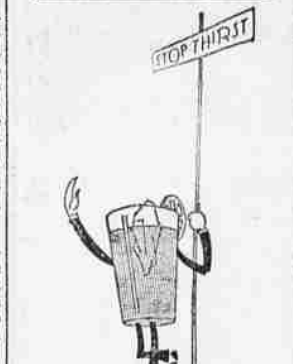
Mrs. Godfrey and her son and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Al Godfrey motored to Cascadia over the week end.

VICTOR COMPANY FAILS TO GIVE DIVIDENDS

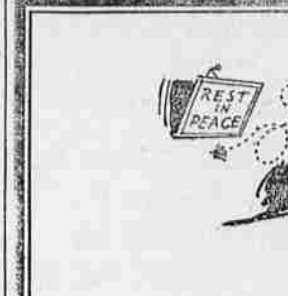
