

# ERRORS COSTLY SENATORS LOSE TO ALBANY NINE

The Salem Senators lost their second game of the Interstate league series when the Albany nine defeated them on the Oxford park diamond yesterday afternoon by a score of 4 to 3. The game was well played with the exception of the playing of Bouton, shortstop for the Senators, who came up with two errors at critical moments, one of which let in the winning run.

This is the second defeat of the season handed the Senators. The race is tightened by the loss and the locals will have to play air-tight ball the rest of the season if they win the Interstate league pennant.

**Lead Until Eighth.**

The locals were ahead until the eighth inning when Albany bunched three hits which coupled with an error, netted them two runs and tied the score. They pushed over the winning run in the last inning.

Wilkinson was the fielding star of the game, handling eleven chances without a bobbie. He started two double plays and helped a third. Barham struck out eight of the visitors and allowed nine hits. Beams struck out three and allowed twelve hits, but the three snappy double plays saved him at critical moments.

Each side scored one run in the first inning. In the Albany half, Wilkinson, first man up got a single and stole second; Summers and Brumbaugh were out at first; Hecker got a single and Wilkinson scored; McReynolds went out.

**Score in first.**

Salem scored one in their half when Maple crossed the plate to tie the score. Bouton, first man up went out at first; Maple got a double, stole third and scored on Gleason's error; Proctor and Steers were easy out.

In their half of the fourth, the locals scored two runs to take the lead which they held until the fatal eighth. Proctor, first man up got a double; Steers got a single, and Proctor crossed the plate; Keene flew out to left field; Rinehart went out at first and Steers went to second; Barr got a single and Steers scored; Edwards fanned.

The Albany team tied the score in the eighth when they scored two runs. Wilkinson got a single and went to third when Steers threw the ball to Proctor, who let the ball go into the bleachers. Rankin called his back to second and there was considerable wrangling over the decision. Albany agreed to continue the game under protest. Summers got a single; Brumbaugh fanned; Hecker went out. Proctor to second; Wilkinson scored; and Summers went to third; McReynolds got a single

and Summers scored. **Win in Ninth.**

In the ninth the visitors scored the winning run when Quisenberry got a double and went to third on Gleason's out at first. Beams went out at first; Wilkinson was safe at first on Bouton's error and Quisenberry scored. In their half of the ninth the locals tried hard to rally but were stopped by one of the snappy double plays completed by Albany. Rinehart fanned. Barr got a hit and went to second on a hit by Coleman, who was batting for Edwards; Barham hit into a double play and the game was over.

The Port of Portland defeated the Hillsboro baseball nine yesterday afternoon by a score of 3 to 0 in an exhibition game. The West Linn-Luckenbach game scheduled to be played at West Linn yesterday was cancelled. Salem and Albany were the only two to play in the Interstate league series. The Hillsboro nine was scheduled to play Camas at Camas.

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# PIONEER SALEM MASON, BAILIFF OF COURT, DEAD

George P. Litchfield, oldest Salem member of the Masonic lodge, for a number of years bailiff of the circuit court of Marion county, and pioneer member of the A. O. U. W., died at his home in Salem Saturday afternoon, July 4. He was 85 years at the time of his death. Death was caused by heart failure. His wife, Aurelia Craft, whom he married in 1886, was one of the first white children born in the city of Salem. She died in 1918.

Mr. Litchfield was born June 23, 1840, at West Woodstock, Windham county, Connecticut. He came to Oregon in 1861, and was married in 1866.

In his youth Litchfield was in the United States Indian service on the Siletz and Grande Ronde reservations, gaining for himself the reputation of an honest man and trusted friend among the Indians. For many years he was in the grocery business at Salem. He had been a member of the First Methodist church here for 53 years.

Death overtook him suddenly and unexpectedly. He was walking about the house at his residence, 1632 Center street, wearing his clothes and slippers. Heart failure set in, with fatal results, before doctors could be summoned.

He is survived by one great grand child, 10 grandchildren, and the following children: Charles L. of Portland, George F. of Salem, Mrs. Alma Schindler of Salem, Mrs. Cora Holman of Salem, Mrs. Gertrude Scott of Salem, and Miss Helen of Salem.

Funeral services have been set for 2:15 afternoon at 3:30 at the Elgdon mortuary. Salem lodge No. 4 of the Masons will have charge at the grave, which will be located in the L. O. O. F. cemetery. Rev. Fred C. Taylor of the First Methodist church will have charge of services at the chapel.

# DAIRYING HERE DECLARED NEED

Claiming that by diversified farming and the use of dairy herds the wealth of the Willamette valley could be materially increased, Chris Johnson, representing the North Pacific Co-operative association, cited statistics of bank deposits in cities near Salem and compared them with those of cities in the middle west where dairying is carried on extensively. Bank deposits in Salem amount to approximately \$9,000,000 annually, he stated. By his comparison, with dairying and diversified farming they should reach a total of between \$50,000,000 and \$100,000,000 annually. He cited one town in the middle west the size of the average town near Salem which has bank deposits of nearly \$3,000,000 a year. Bank deposits, as quoted by him, of Willamette valley towns are as follows: Mt. City, \$175,000; Stayton, \$585,000; Mt. Angel, \$597,000; Woodburn, \$333,000.

He advocated pushing the sale of butter in the United States, stating that at present less of the product is consumed in this country per capita than in either Australia or Canada. "The trouble with too much of it," he said, "is that a little of it goes a long way."

Mr. Johnson stated that the quality of butter produced in Oregon should be raised by introducing improved methods of sanitation and cooling.
