Stayton, July 7.—Jack Ryan and Harry Hevenham, who have been held in the city jail for the past week are again free. The boys were charged with stealing the car of L. A. Loomer, but at an informal hearing before Justice of the Peace Greer, the complaint was dismissed under the proviso that the boys secure employment and pay for all damage done to the car.

Judge Greer after considering the case for some time concluded that there was no evidence of an attempt to steal the car; nor was there any evidence of such a nature as to warrant him binding the boys over to the grand jury; consequently he dismissed the action pending due restitution to be made the owner of the car by young Ryan and Harry Hevenham.
