SALEM PASTOR'S SON NEW HEAD OF C. E. SOCIETIES

Dr. Daniel A. Polking, son of Rev. and Mrs. C. C. Polking of Salem, was last night elected president of the United Society of Christian Endeavor, holding the annual convention in Portland. Dan Polking is well known in Salem, having led a revival campaign here within the past few months, and spoken before numerous public gatherings. Tentative arrangements have been made to have him speak before the union convention meeting in Wilson Park next Sunday afternoon, which will open the summer's series.

Rev. C. C. Polking is pastor of the First Evangelical church here, and was recently elected president of the Salem Ministerial association. The son and new head of the national Christian Endeavor was 352 North 12th street, and Fred was the last night elected president of the United Society of Christian Endeavor at Portland high school education at Portland later attending Dallas college at Dallas. While here he made a name for himself as an athlete and orator. In a field meet staged against Willamette university at Salem he took five first, two second and one third prize. In 1903 he won the state football championship.

His brother, Paul Polking, graduated from Willamette university last month, having made his letter in baseball, made the basketball squad, and been elected president of his class.

At present "Dan" Polking is minister of Marble Collegiate church in New York city, the oldest Protestant church in North America from the standpoint of continuous religious service, having had an unbroken line of pastors since the year 1623. Among its members have been Peter Stuyvesant, famous Dutch figure in the city's earliest days, and Theodore Roosevelt, comparatively recent national political figure.

Dr. Polking takes the place of Dr. Francis E. Clark of Eastern as president of the national organization. Dr. Clark founded the United Society of Christian Endeavor and has been its head for 49 years.

CITY REFUSES TO ACCEPT OLD WAR TROPHIES

Improvement of the following streets: A street from 16th to 17th, Broadway from Columbia to Highland, North 14th from Marion to D. North 16th from A to D. Residents on North 17th street from Center street south in a communication demanding the improvement of that street, declaring that the street is really a private instead of a street, that the donations of the "bad hands" have to cart in their household supplies in wheelbarrows, and that there had been some thought of a petition that the city furnish pack mules for the purpose. After the reading of the communication it was stated that the improvement has already been ordered, and the city recorder was instructed to inform the persons who sent in the communication.

An ordinance was passed assessing the cost for the improvement of the alley in block 19, which totals \$1041.36.

Emergency Act Passed. Electrical measure caused by the establishing of a swimming resort on 21st street, an ordinance was put through three readings and passed prohibiting the parking of automobiles on city streets and instructing the city engineer and contractor to place signs to that effect on all bridges in the city, including the east end of the Marion-Polk county bridge.

An ordinance was passed establishing a grade at Myrtle avenue from Highland to Fairgrounds road.

In addition to the two ordinances providing for increase in the salaries of the chief of police and fire chief, ordinances were introduced to assess the cost of improving South Cottage street from Ferry to Trade and Oak street from Liberty to High.
