

# BURROUGHS BACK WITH TITLE WON AT IDAHO MEET

Julian Burroughs, resident of Salem, graduate of Salem high school and student of Oregon Agricultural college, has returned to this city from Lewiston, Idaho, having won for himself the northwest championship in fancy diving. The Pacific Northwest association meeting was held at Lewiston on July 2, 3, 4 and 5. Nearly 100 contestants from every part of the northwest were present at the meet. Burroughs will enter the United States national meet to be held in Seattle July 29 to August 1. He represents Multnomah Amateur Athletic club of Portland. At O. A. C. he has won his letter for three years and represented his school on trips to various parts of the country.

Previous to going to Lewiston, Burroughs went with the Multnomah team, consisting of two men and five women, to a meet staged at Vancouver, B. C. The second man on the team was Orville Peterson of Spokane. The women were all Portland residents. At Vancouver, Burroughs won second place in the fancy diving the first night and first place on the second and third nights. Dates were June 27, 28 and 30. All dives were taken from a board fixed three meters, or nearly 10 feet, above the surface of the water. The fancy diving events included the 2 1/2 summerault, flying front and other features. The contest was staged according to Canadian rules which differ chiefly from those of the United States in designating the dives by different names than those familiar to American divers. The women representing Multnomah club won every thing in the speed and distance swimming. Burroughs did not enter the swimming contests.

The meet at Vancouver was staged as part of the opening of a new \$200,000 swimming tank built there. The roof and sides of the building which encloses the tank are made of glass, making the structure resemble a huge greenhouse. More than 100 swimmers and divers from all parts of the west were present at the grand opening. Cups were awarded but no titles were at stake. The Multnomah delegation left Vancouver on July 1. Dominion day competition was keener than at Vancouver, northwest titles being at stake. Contests were held in the Snake river, which Burroughs declares was the only reasonably cool thing in the vicinity. The mercury rose to 110 and 112 every day. The

diving events, which he won over all contestants, were taken from a 10-foot board.

The five women swimmers from Portland were not taken to Lewiston.

The national meet to be held at Seattle, beginning July 29, will mark the first time a meet of its kind has been staged in the northwest. Burroughs will be pitted against Pete Jardine of Miami, Florida, and probably Al White, Stanford diver and recent member of the Olympic club of San Francisco. White won everything in the way of fancy diving at the Olympic games in 1924, Jardine taking second. At the tryouts for the Olympic team Burroughs was matched, along with numerous other American divers, against both Jardine and White. Burroughs took fourth place in the tryouts.

Other internationally known contestants at the meet in Seattle will be Johnny Weismuller of the Illinois Athletic club, the fastest swimmer in the world, and Arman Borg of Sweden, world's champion distance swimmer.

The meet will be held on the University of Washington campus, in the canal connecting Lake Washington with Lake Union.

Burroughs has been entered for the plain high diving as well as the low boards fancy diving. The low boards diving will be from 4-foot and 10-foot boards. The high diving board will be elevated 39 feet from the surface of the water.
