

### EGGS DROP BACK TO OLD LEVEL ON PORTLAND MART

Portland, July 9.—Top grade eggs are lower today both extras and firsts losing yesterday's gain of a cent on the dairy exchange. Extras are now posted at 37 cents and firsts at 36 cents on local board. Other grades are unchanged at 35 and 33 cents respectively on pullets and current receipts.

Butte is steady although local market continues to maintain firm undertone. Birds were unchanged on the dairy board.

Very little country dressed meat is arriving on the street and there is good demand for both top veal and hogs. Choice light hams are at 14 1/2 cents and choice light pork 19 to 19 1/2 cents. The dollar advance in calves at the yards today is reflected along the street.

Live poultry scarce with a good call for all lines. Prices generally steady with exception of ducks being a fraction easier at 20 cents for young white Pekins.

### INSPECTORS SAY CHERRIES PACKED HERE GRADE HIGH

Government food inspectors who examined cherries packed in storage by the black cherry association for fresh shipment, pronounced the cherries in perfect condition in every way, according to Manager Brooks of the pool.

He states he handed the inspectors a batch and told them to go through the boxes in any way they wished, and they did. "The result of the inspection shows that we can get out a good pack in perfect shape for shipping, even at this late date in the season," stated Brooks. "We have been compelled to reject many cherries to do it, but with our last car rolls today, it will contain quality cherries."

The car going out today was the one the association expected to ship yesterday, but did not complete its loading, which will be finished today. Tomorrow the association packers expect to work on less than carload lots.

### TOURIST TRAVEL THRU SALEM ONLY HALF LAST YEAR'S

Believed that many tourists have been deceived by the state highway signs leading out of Corvallis into the belief that the regular Pacific highway is on the west side. The signs read "Albany-Corvallis highway."

Definite reports have also been circulating for some time that deliberate efforts have been made to keep tourists away from the city. Reports have come from as far south as Roseburg and as far north as Portland that garage men and automobile dealers have advised travelers to steer clear of Salem. Treatment given them by Salem authorities has been given as one reason for their enmity to the city.

Even should a driver keep to the west side from Corvallis he can still turn toward Salem at Hickreath, the drive from Hickreath to Portland, through Salem being only 6 1/2 miles longer than the drive from Hickreath to Portland through McMinnville, according to statistics given by the state highway department.

Six new signs were placed in the vicinity of Hickreath yesterday, notifying the tourist of the route to Salem. One sign located a quarter of a mile south of Hickreath measures 10 by 30 feet.

The matter of placing signs on 5th and 6th streets in Portland, directing traffic toward Salem, has been taken up with authorities. Signs are already up directing them to the west side highway.

It is believed locally that while a considerable amount of traffic will always go on the west side highway as long as it has its present good pavement, an undue proportion has been taking that route during recent months. Efforts made to bring the traffic back to the east side have already been

### RUBBER QUOTED AT NEW RECORD FOR 9 YEARS

London, July 8.—Rubber for immediate delivery touched 44 1/2 pence per pound on the exchange here today, the highest quotation since February, 1916. The advance is due to a decreased supply as a result of the scheme for restriction of output from rubber plantations and a continuing insistent demand for rubber from manufacturers.

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### GOOD CROPS AND PRICES ARE SEEN

Portland, July 9.—Farm crops throughout the middle west, the intermountain states and Oregon and Washington will be larger this season than in 1924, declared E. A. Smith, supervisor of agriculture for the Union Pacific system, on his arrival here from Omaha to confer with Herbert Work, secretary of the Interior and Elwood Mead, commissioner of reclamation. Smith will accompany the government officials through eastern Oregon and Idaho.

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
