

CANCER VIRUS IS REVEALED BY LONDON HATTER

New York, July 15.—(AP)—A London hatter by day with an all absorbing hobby for microscopes by night has made possible the perception of the infectious agent for cancer. But New York authorities are inclined to doubt that any great step toward a cure for the disease has been taken.

Dr. J. E. Barnard of King College, London, divided his time between his hat shop in the west end and his collection of microscopes. He went to the aid of Dr. William E. Gye, a member of the British Institute of Medical Research, who was interested in the study of the cancer.

Through the powerful lens of one of Dr. Barnard's specially constructed microscopes they saw and photographed the cancer virus.

Observations of these physicians say the Lancet, the leading British medical journal, have progressed to such an extent that "the existence of the living cancer virus would appear to be established."

New York scientists said today that the British development was the result of discovery here. Dr. Peyton Rous of the Rockefeller Institute for medical research found that tumors in chickens were caused by an ultra-microscopic organism too small to be seen through the ordinary microscope.

Mith Dr. Hideo Noguchi, also of the Rockefeller Institute, Dr. Rous perfected an instrument known as the ultra-microscope, with which they found in a chicken a transmissible sarcoma with a tendency to multiply through the body.

From the sarcoma an emulsion was prepared. It was injected into the body of healthy fowl and produced cancerous conditions which in some cases resulted in death. In 1912 Dr. Rous exhibited some of the animals in which he had produced cancer by inoculation. They included not only chickens, but rats and mice.

RIVER STEAMER TO DOCK 18 MILES NORTH OF SALEM

The Northwestern river freighter operated on the Willamette river by the Salem Navigation company, will resume its schedule this morning, leaving Portland at 4 a. m. Decision was reached by Fred Karr, head of the company, to route the boat only as far as Irwinton, a point some 18 miles north of Salem. He will build a warehouse there, he has stated, and put on three trucks, each with a trailer, between Salem and Irwinton.

The Northwestern arrived in Portland late last week, having got caught on a bar on the trip down and been pulled off only with considerable effort.

Mr. Karr states that the bars which threaten to stop the boat on its trip are all between Salem and Irwinton. Between Irwinton and Portland there is an average of 46 feet of water, he states, with the most shallow places not being less than 10 feet deep.

The present plan is to put on a daily service, leaving Portland every morning at 4 o'clock.

NEWSBOYS OF DENVER WILL BE LICENSED

Denver, Colo., July 15.—(AP)—The shadow of an official list of "don'ts" hung over the newsboys of Denver today, as the result of the passage last night by the city council of an ordinance prohibiting shouting in selling papers, requiring each youth to obtain a city license and specifying the corner on which he may operate.

The ordinance requires that all newsboys must sell from stands on designated street corners and each stand must offer for sale editions of every Denver daily newspaper. Licenses would be issued without charge. The ordinance now goes to Mayor Stapleton for signature or veto.
