The government pilot driver arrived at Grand Island, some 13 miles down the river from Salem, today, and the crew is expected to begin work tomorrow closing the channel on the west side of the island. The entire flow of water in the river will be sent down the east side of the island, making the river bed considerably deeper on that side, and making it dry on the west side. It is thought that when the work is finished the Northwestern will be able to steam past Grand Island without difficulty.

## SAYS SO CALLED PRINCESS FAKE

New York, July 15 (AP)—Suggestions in recent special dispatches from Berlin that Anastasia, one of the daughters of the former Russian czar, is alive, are doubted by Glen E. Botkin, once a member of the czar's entourage, now living here.

He is convinced that the woman who has represented herself to the former court Princess Cecelia as grand Duchess Anastasia is a fraud.

"I received practically conclusive evidence that Anastasia was killed," he said, "when I completed a personal investigation into the fate of my father, who was killed with the members of the czar's family in Ekaterinburg, Siberia, on July 17, 1918."

Botkin himself was arrested with members of the royal family and broke out when the first revolution broke out in September, 1917, to Tobolsk, in western Siberia.

Later the remainder of the party except Botkin and his sister were taken to Ekaterinburg.

When the white guards captured Ekaterinburg in July, 1918, Botkin went there and executed the entire party had been executed three days before his arrival.

## SALEM MEN IN CARAVAN TO VISIT DIAMOND LAKE

Murphy of Rickford, Ill., and of Frances and Beatrice Murphy of St. Paul.

## SALESMAN PLAYS GOOD SAMARITAN TO COLT

Klamath Falls, Or., July 15.—A two day old colt, deserted by its mother and half famished was given a 10 mile ride in a small coupe to water and shelter by O. E. Marshall, Portland traveling man.

The Portland man, who arrived here yesterday, told of the incident. He saw the baby colt by the dusty roadside while driving home from Burns and Lakeview. He stopped to give it water, but the animal was such a pitiful sight he picked it up bodily and placed it in his coupe. The legs of the animal hung from the opened window.

For 10 miles Marshall drove his strange passenger over the rough road until he reached a farmhouse. There a farmer woman gave the colt shelter and was feeding it warm milk when the traveling man motored onward.

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## COOLIDGE SAYS BUSINESS GOOD

Swampscott, Mass., July 15.—(AP)—President Coolidge is optimistic over the present outlook for business.

He is keeping a close watch on business conditions and in a conference today with Charles D. Hillis, republican national committeeman from New York, expressed his satisfaction with the situation. The president is receiving reports on business conditions as well as government affairs at his summer home here. Mr. Hillis also gave an enthusiastic report on the business outlook in the east.

Mr. Hillis, who is mentioned as a possible successor to Secretary Weeks, should the latter feel unable to return to his post from his sick bed in the fall, said he did not discuss politics.

Referring to reports that he was a possible candidate for governor of New York, Mr. Hillis said he could not decline a position which has not been offered to him.

## JUDGE IN ELLINGSON CASE TO NAME EXPERT

San Francisco, July 15.—(AP)—Dorothy Ellingson's trial of August 11, on a charge of murdering her mother, Mrs. Anna Ellingson, may be turned into the first test of a new law permitting a judge to name his own alienists in a criminal case.

The law, effective July 24, authorizes the appointment of one or more experts to examine the defendant's sanity and testify as witnesses in the court. Such action is taken by Judge Harold Louderback the constitutionality of the statute might be attacked, counsel for both sides said.

## RANGERS REPORT RAIN IN CASCADE FORESTS

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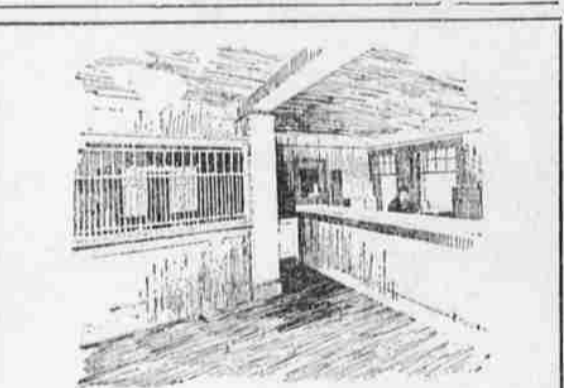
