

CLEAVER SAYS CHRISTENSEN NOT HIS CHOICE

George L. Cleaver, former state prohibition commissioner, now a special agent of the governor, takes exception to the statement of a Portland newspaper that he is directing a force of special agents and that A. Christensen, another special agent who is under arrest on a charge of conspiracy to violate the prohibition law, is one of the members of his force.

Christensen was commissioned by the governor on April 8, this year. Cleaver cites a letter written by him to Governor Pierce on May 25, 1924, in which he advised against the employment of Christensen. In this letter Cleaver called attention to the fact that J. C. Erickson, district attorney for Clatsop county, wanted a commission for Christensen, whom he had employed on prohibition cases in that county. Cleaver informed the governor in the letter that Christensen had been let out of federal prohibition employment the previous summer by J. A. Linville, federal prohibition director for Oregon. Cleaver also stated that Christensen had come to him for employment. Cleaver refused to recommend him for the reasons that there was no vacancy in his department and that he considered it unwise to take on a man who had been let out by a department engaged in similar work.

Cleaver further advised the governor that Christensen had bought a hotel in Astoria and that he was at enmity with McKnight and Marshall, two federal prohibition agents at Astoria, and that Christensen was doing all he possible could to discredit them.

"We are not encouraging farmers to plant large tracts in flax to begin," Teutsch declared. "Five acres at the start is plenty. We are still in the experiment stage of flax culture and unless a grower is confident of his advantage it is best that he does not run the risk of loss until he has determined the adaptability of his soil in flax."

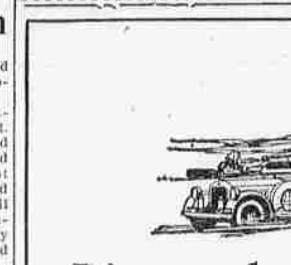
