

### GRANTS PASS IS HOST TO EDITORS AT CONFERENCE

Grants Pass, Ore., July 17.—Better newspapers is the general theme of the discussion outlined for the summer meeting of the Oregon State Educational association, which opens here today. The editorial side of the newspaper establishment is featured in the program, to the exclusion of business problems.

The morning session today was devoted to the reports of the officers, including that of President Hal Horn, the report secretary and a report by the University of Oregon on a survey of advertising rates.

Thomas Nelson, of the Junction City Times, will open the afternoon program with a talk on "Better Newspapers." Frank Jenkins of the Register, Eugene will speak on the question "Is it possible to minimize crime news and yet publish a successful newspaper?" Robert Ruhl, of the Mail Tribune, Medford, is to lead the discussion.

Clara D. Foster, editor and publisher of the Lewis County Advocate, of Chehalis, Wash., will speak on "Peace can be sold to the world through advertising."

Mrs. Kate W. Jameson, dean of women at Oregon Agricultural College, will tell the editors what should be the attitude of the news paper towards the flapper, and the jazz and other things that have to do with the flapper.

Paul Cowles, superintendent of the western division of The Associated Press, will talk on "Gathering the news of the world."

The quality of English used in news writing is the subject of Professor C. J. McIntosh, Dr. E. T. Hodge, professor of geology, of the University of Oregon, will talk on Oregon's position in the great Pacific earthquake belt. Will H. Evans, of the Morning Democrat, Baker, will talk on "Better newspapers must be free from publicity."

The annual banquet will be held tonight and tomorrow will be devoted to a trip to the Oregon caves.

### SCHEDULE FOR TWILIGHT LEAGUE AGAIN REVIVED

The Eagles are just as confident, however, as they will have their entire lineup back for this game. The first meeting was played with several substitutes in the lineup.
