

### CALIFORNIA TO AMEND RULES OF RING CONTESTS

San Francisco, July 17.—The California Athletic commission has decided to amend the Marquis of Queensbury rules to the extent of allowing a boxer knocked out of the ring 20 seconds instead of 10 to crawl back through the ropes and resume a fighting posture.

Commissioner Hanlon explained to newspapermen here:

"In some cases it would be impossible for a boxer knocked out of the ring to get back within ten seconds. If he is still physically able to continue it does not seem fair to rule him as knocked out. Twenty seconds will allow him sufficient time."

A currently averse instance was when Jack Dempsey was knocked into the press stand by Louis Firpo. But Jack managed to climb back within ten seconds and to retain enough stamina to knock out Firpo the next round.

Mr. Hanlon also announced that the commission had determined to do away with "Stalling" in California fights.

"I shall instruct the referees," he said, "to notify the fighters that prolonged clinching will not be sanctioned. If boxers fail to heed the warning, referee may in his discretion throw them out and declare it no contest. Furthermore, if, in the referee's judgment, fighters have been deliberately stalling, he will recommend that their purses be held up, and we will conduct an investigation."

**MISSING WOMAN BACK; STRANGE TALE PUZZLES**

Calxico, Cal., July 17.—(AP)—Murder theories built upon the strange disappearance last Monday of Mrs. Virginia Coolman, Orange county farmette and occasional writer of fiction, collapsed late last night with the appearance at police headquarters here of the missing woman herself.

Between hysterical sobs the woman told officers she had been kidnapped by three men in a big automobile who crowded her small coupe to the edge of the road in Orange county park and dragged her out of it. She said her captors bound her and carried her away to an underground apartment from which she was able to escape unharmed with the assistance of a Chinese boy whose friendship she won by praising his cooking and who smuggled her out in a basket.

Police admit themselves mystified.

### MILLION DOLLAR SIGN CORPORATION FORMED

Los Angeles, Cal., July 17.—Announcement was made today of the launching of the one million dollar electrical products corporation, with principal factory and offices here and branch factories and offices in San Francisco, Seattle and Denver.

The corporation which was formed through the consolidation of the electric products corporation, the Claude Neon Lights and financial interests in Los Angeles, will manufacture and install electrical signs, utilizing a new process of illumination developed from the liquidation of rare gases extracted from the air.

### COOLIDGE AND DAVIS CONFER

Swampscott, Mass., July 17.—(AP)—President Coolidge arranged his schedule today to enable to confer with Secretary Davis of the labor department before motoring to Camp Devens to review the 16th national guard division.

The secretary came to Swampscott to go over departmental matters and to discuss the labor situation generally with the executive before sailing Saturday for Europe.

Significance was given to his visit by the possibility of a deadlock between anthracite operators and miners over a new wage scale, with suspension of operations in the hard coal fields resulting, and it was considered likely that Mr. Davis would give a comprehensive report on the situation and his opinion as to what should be done in event of a tie up.

### WOOD IS OPPOSED TO PUBLIC OWNERSHIP

Manila, July 17.—(A.P.)—Governor General Leonard Wood told the Philippine legislature yesterday that the government should transfer to private enterprise all railroad, mines and agricultural enterprises now under its control.

Another outstanding feature of the governor general's annual message was the possibility of the government going on a cash basis due to the increase in revenues in 1924.

Governor Wood said, the Filipinos are a generally happy and contented people living under steadily improving conditions. "While there have been no serious disturbances there have been some indications of local unrest which affected public order," he said. "None of these had the character of organized resistance to authority and they were due generally to the action of misguided people following fanatical leaders."

### THIELSEN GIVEN VERDICT BY JURY IN DAMAGE CASE

F. B. Thielson was relieved of any liability for damages in a verdict rendered by a jury in circuit court in the case brought against him by Hazel DeLaney as administratrix of the estate of Ralph Flint. The action was for \$7500, young Flint having been killed when his bicycle was struck down by Thielson's automobile.

Evidence introduced by Thielson showed that Flint's bicycle was zigzagging when emerging from Miller street onto High street, where the accident occurred. In his instructions to the jury Judge Kelly advised them that if they found negligence on the part of the defendant Thielson must be absolved from blame, or if there was negligence on the part of both that the verdict must be for the defendant, as in that case the law leaves the two just where it finds them.
