

Cornerstone of New School To Be Laid Sunday

Right Rev. A. Hillebrand, P. A., administrator of the archdiocese, will lay the cornerstone of the new St. Vincent de Paul school, in North Salem tomorrow at 2 p. m. Right Rev. J. H. Black, P. A., chancellor of the archdiocese, will be archpriest, Rev. A. Lafek of Sublimity, deacon; Rev. Frank Scher-

bring, Shaw, sub-deacon, and Rev. Vincent Keenan, pastor of the new parish, master of ceremonies. Addresses will be made by Monsignor Hillebrand, Rev. Joseph Burns, pastor of St. Joseph's parish, Salem, and Frank Davey, Portland, state deputy of the Knights of Columbus and long a resident of Salem.

A choir of Sacred Heart academy students will furnish the music. Following the ceremony a dinner will be given by Father Keenan for the priests of the deanery and the advisory committee of the parish. The Sisters of the Holy Names

will teach in the new school which will open this fall with six grades. One wing of the school will be used for the present as a parish hall and the basement will serve as a chapel until the church is built. Work will begin on the church this fall. The school is being erected

at the corner of Columbia street and Myrtle avenue and is near the Highland station of the Oregon Electric. This is the first parochial school to be undertaken in the archdiocese since the anti-private school law was invalidated. L. A. Goldsley is the designer of the building.
