

REFUSE HALF MILLION DOLLAR ORDER FOR LOGANS

CALL FOR 75,000 CASES REJECTED BY LOCAL PLANT

It is reported that a local cannery has just turned down an order of 75,000 cases of canned loganberries from the Rocky Mountain region in the neighborhood of half a million dollars worth of business because of the impossibility of securing the berries. The cannery loganberry situation, with unquestionably the largest pack in history, put up, presents a new record, with virtually every loganberry reported sold. Logans recently are reported to have been going strong at 5 1/2 cents, but with only a few days more picking left.

While no estimate can be made of the possible amount of the loganberry pack this year, there is little question it will far exceed last year, and last year was the biggest in the loganberry business to that time, in fact the pack around Salem last year almost equaled the total pack for Oregon and Washington of the preceding year.

Last year's pack was completely up when canning started this year and it may be safely said that the big pack of this year is off the market and the decks are cleaned for another year's business.

Raspberry Shortage Helps
The big come-back of the loganberry is attributed practically in its entirety to the sudden development of the British taste for the tart, acid sweetness of the enormous logan. This taste has been developed to such an extent it is said, is the short crop of raspberries, with the consequent high price. The Britisher is a notoriously heavy raspberry eater. He likes it. The loganberry is a son of the raspberry, the raspberry, according to all current reports, being the mother of the big, sturdy logan, which stands head and shoulders in size over its mother, and with unfilial regard seemingly threatens to crowd his mother from the place of eminence she has held in the British taste.

At any rate, the logan has taken the English market like wild fire.

Growers Warned
At the same time, those familiar with the situation here, declare that this is no reason for farmers to run wild and start a heavy campaign of loganberry planting. The fact is, there are probably a vast number more logans here right now than there would be any call for in a normal year, must be remembered that this is a short year for logans and if the present acreage produced anything like a normal crop, there probably would be a glut of the berries and growers would again be begging for consideration.

However, with a growing market, there seems reason to believe that what acreage there is can be handled in years to come, but to go back and endeavor to repeat the process of wild planting would mean another term of hardship for loganberry growers, it is declared.

GIRL RIDING IN CAR SHOT 2 BOYS HELD

Adams, 23 years, caused the two boys, the boys separating, one going to each side of the road. Oswald Koenig, stated that he raised the gun to his shoulder and snapped the trigger. He declares the unexpected happened when there was a report from the gun and the bullet hit the rear of the car. When they saw what had happened, with out waiting to discover whether anyone had been injured, they jumped to the side of the road and ran away through the brush.

August Fitch, who was driving the car, told a story which coincided with that of the boys. He said he noticed the boys walking along the road, noticed that they separated, one on each side of the road and let the car pass, and the next he knew he heard a report, and the bullet hit the back of the car. Turning he saw Miss Moore get down into the car. He stopped the car, and the occupants of the car, fearful for Miss Moore's life, rushed her to the office of Dr. J. H. Garstjohst in Salem.

Officers who were at the Moore home this morning stated that the young woman was up and around, but her right leg was badly swollen. Arrangements had been made for bringing her to Salem today to be operated on and the bullet removed by Dr. Garstjohst.

The Koenig boys stated that they had lived about a week in their present home at the top of the Wheatland Hill. Their parents also live there. The boys say they lived at Linden, Wash., about two months before coming here and two and one-half years at Park City, Mont., before that.

The injured girl is well known in Salem, having lived here most of her life. Her father, Jesse Moore, was for many years employed by the Salem Water company before moving to the ranch at Hopewell where he now resides.

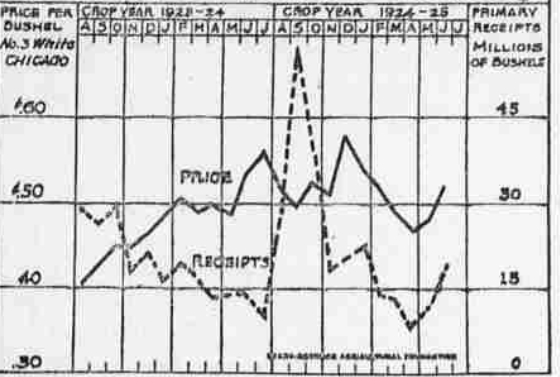
Everyone connected with the case states that no reason is known why the Koenig boys should have wilfully shot at the car. The boys did not know the occupants of the car, had never seen or heard of them as far as known and no incentive for a deliberate or wilful shooting is known.

The boys also were examined today by District Attorney Carson and Deputy District Attorney Page. After examination Deputy District Attorney Page instructed the sheriff to release the older Koenig boy and keep Oswald for the time being. Officers generally connected with the case are convinced that the shooting was accidental but at the same time the result of gross carelessness. Decision had not been reached as to whether the younger boy would be prosecuted or released. The boy also told his story to Jesse Moore, father of the young woman.

Shortage Shown in New Oat Crop

Owing to dry weather in May and the early June heat, the new crop of oats is a poor one, the official forecast being 250 million bushels under last year's harvest, according to P. V. Ewing of the Research Division of the Economic Research Administration. This, however, does not reflect all the damage done, his survey states. While the carryover of old oats probably will be above the average, it will make up only a small part of the shortage in the new crop. Primary receipts during the after harvest movement last year were the heaviest on record, but from February to May, they were consistently below normal. In June the movement was practically up to normal volume again. The visible supply diminished 40 million bushels from Feb. 14 to the end of May, the largest decrease recorded for this period of the year. Recently, the increase in receipts has resulted in a small gain in the visible supply. Clearances for export for the entire crop year will be only about 10 million bushels. The outlook for better oats prices is very good.

OREGON RANGES ABOVE NORMAL; CATTLE STRONG

Portland, July 20—Ranges are generally in very good to excellent condition in the coast intermountain and Northern Rocky mountain sections, with feed conditions much better than a year ago, while dry conditions continue in the south-west according to the monthly stock range report issued by the United States division of crop and livestock estimates.

Cattle are generally in very good shape all the range country except Texas and the southwest. Sheep in all of the range country except in Arizona, Texas and New Mexico are in very fine shape in the southwest, sheep are in fair condition and there has been some loss of lambs. The early lambs of Idaho, Oregon and Washington have been unusually good and shipments to markets are heavy.

In Oregon ranges and farm pastures are reported to be in excellent condition for this time of year, cattle and sheep being in fine shape.

Taking 100 as normal, Oregon ranges July 1 were 105 compared with 68 a year ago, and in Idaho 110 compared with 62 last year at this time.

On the same basis of estimate, cattle in Oregon July 1 were 95 per cent of normal condition, whereas a year ago this month the condition was 84. Oregon sheep were 98 per cent of normal condition July 1 compared with 85 last July.
