News Comes From B.P.W. Convention

Copies of the Portland, Maine, Telegram of July 12 have been received in this city with an eight page supplement devoted to the then beginning national convention of the Business and Professional Women's clubs. Pictures of a few of the Oregon representatives appear, among them being that of Miss Grace E. Smith of Salem, with an article concerning Miss Smith and her rise to the position of one of the assistants to the attorney general of Oregon.

The leading editorial of the issue was also devoted to the organization, saying in part: "The Business and Professional Women's club is a name that has figured in the public prints with in recent years for the organization is comparatively a new one. But whoever was responsible for it had a most brilliant idea, for the organization as soon as launched spread with lightning rapidity until it has encompassed the continent. No organization in Portland plays a more important part in the business and social life of the city than does the local B.P.W. club. Portland is highly honored in having the opportunity to entertain the national convention of these able, energetic and far seeing business women of the country. They are coming, we are told, from Oregon, Washington, California, Texas, Florida, the great middle west, from nearly every state, 2000 strong." Further items state that in six years the organization has become a power in forty seven states, in the Hawaiian Islands, Canada, and now Buenos Aires seeks admission.

When Adella Prichard of Portland, Oregon, the national president, struck her gavel calling to order this seventh convention of the Business and Professional Women's clubs, the attention of 50,000 business and professional women of the country was focused on Portland, Maine, and the business that will be transacted by their representatives in that convention.

The Salem Business and Professional Women's club has approximately 100 members, and is fortunate in having three representatives at this inspiring convention. Dr. Mary Purvine, Mrs. D. R. Koenig, retiring president and secretary, respectively, and Miss Grace Smith, T. members of the local club expect to reap the reward of the enthusiasm these representative women will bring back to Salem after having had a part in the sessions so carefully outlined by the executive heads of this national federation.
