

### BANKERS DEFEAT LEGION TOSSERS IN 3 TO 2 BATTLE

The United States Bankers team of the Twilight League showed their class last night when they defeated the American Legion nine on the Oxford park diamond by a 3 to 2 score. The winners scored two runs in the last inning which gave them the count. The game was fast and played before one of the largest crowds yet seen at the park for a Twilight League game.

In the first inning the Bankers scored one run when Frazier got life on a fly ball which Gabrielson dropped. Frazier went to second on a passed ball and went to third on Humphreys' out at first. K. Thompson fanned. At first, Thompson scored on a balk by Jenkins, Legion twirler.

In the third inning the Legion nine took the lead which they held until the fifth. Gabrielson was caught between second and first trying to steal but Humphrey dropped the ball and he was safe. Sullivan and Jenkins fanned, and Gabrielson crossed the plate on two passed balls. Laird was safe on E. Thompson's error and went to third on Parker's double. He scored later on a passed ball. Parker went to third on a passed ball but Acton went out Blumberg to Lucas.

In the fifth inning Blumberg, first man up flew out to Gibson. Frazier, who had scored the other Bankers run got a hit. K. Thompson got a hit and Frazier went to third after stealing second. Humphrey was safe on a fielder's choice when the Legion player tried for Frazier at home but were a little late and the score was tied. K. Thompson went to third on the play. Humphrey stole second. Frank Reinhart then worked the count for a while and then proceeded to cross the Legion up when he executed a perfect squeeze play that brought in Thompson with the winning run. The Bankers might be going yet as only one man was out when the Bankers won. The second game of the series will be played tomorrow evening. Blumberg fanned nine of the Legion players. 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### SPECIAL MUSIC GIVES OLCOTT CHANCE TO SING

A special arrangement of music was made for the revival of Sheridan's comedy, "The Rivals," featuring four instruments—piano, first and second violin and cello. Recent revivals of this classic for special performances in New York overlooked the rich resources of quaint music of the eighteenth century. But the presence of Chauncey Olcott in the present cast—or in any cast—is bound to

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suggest some musically embellished interludes in the theater. Naturally there must have been a lyric or two embroidered on those satiny routes of Bath, though most of the manuscripts of "The Rivals" are silent on the subject.

"The Rivals" will come to the Grand theater on Saturday evening, July 25. It is presented by an all-star company including Mrs. Fiske, Chauncey Olcott, Thomas A. Wise, James T. Powers, Lola Fisher, Lotus Robb, Marie Carroll, Kenneth Thomson, Fred Eric, Gerald Rogers, George Tawde and Herbert Belmont. The stage direction is by Harrison Grey Fiske, and the stage settings by David Gaither.

These players have combined for a tour of the United States in honor of the 150th anniversary of the original production of the play. "The Rivals" is one of three of its kind that have shown the ability to survive as favorites of modern stage, along with earlier classics such as Shakespeare's plays. It is not only a picture of the manners of the day in which

Richard Brinsley Sheridan lived, but its general features are those common to all times. The characters are as fresh and the humor as green today as they were in the day of Garrick.

### BODY OF FARMER IS RECOVERED FROM WELL

Olympia, Wash., July 23.—The body of Dennis Murphy, 83-year-old Rochester parish pioneer, who was hurled at the bottom of a 52-foot well Monday when he descended Monday to clean it out, was recovered at 10 o'clock last night. Relays of workers had been digging continuously since Monday afternoon when curbing in the well gave way and covered Dennis Murphy with several tons of earth. Dennis is survived by one sister.
