

VICKS HOSTS AT OVERLAND PARTY THIS EVENING

Free rides, free entertainment and full information on internal combustion engines will feature the Willys-Overland party to be given Thursday and Friday nights at 8 o'clock by Vicky Brothers, Willys-Overland dealers, at their display rooms on South High street.

The guest of honor and principal speaker of the evening is Lee R. Bryant, a representative of Willys-Overland, who has been closely associated for a number of years with H. J. Edwards, W. E. Fisher and A. W. Miller, original engineers and designers of the Willys-Knight engine, and has also been with engineering departments of leading motor car manufacturers for years.

PLAN 7 STORY HOTEL AT KLAMATH FALLS

Eugene, July 22.—Bids will be called within 30 days on an eight-story, 147-room hotel at Klamath Falls, according to announcement of Richard Shepard of Eugene, secretary-treasurer of the Stage Terminal and Hotel company of Oregon, which is to erect the structure.

The McDonald property on the northeast corner of Sixth and Main was purchased for \$20,000 as a site for the hotel, which is to cost another \$190,000, according to Shepard. The company is operating hotels and stage terminals in several Oregon cities now.

Under the blue sky act a permit was issued to the Western Bond & Mortgage company of Portland to sell bonds in the sum of \$1,000,000; and a permit to the National Mortgage & Bond company to sell notes in the sum of \$900,000.

BUTCHERS WILL ASK MINIMUM \$35 WAGE HERE

A contract calling for a reduction of one hour in working time on Saturday, and a standard wage scale of \$35 per week, was drawn up and officially adopted at a business meeting of the local union of butchers and meat cutters last night. A meeting will be requested between representatives of the union and meat butchers within a few days, and an attempt made to have the contract adopted by all master butchers in the city.

Members of the local union this morning declared that they anticipated little difficulty in having the contract adopted by most of the larger butcher shop proprietors in the city, stating that in recent cases the more prominent shops are already paying the wages requested.

Proprietors who do not sign the contracts as asked will not be allowed to display union cards, members of the union state, and an attempt will be made to have the shops boycotted by union labor. At present there is said to be little or nothing required of a shop to permit it to display a union card.

Present hours among butchers are from 8 a. m. until 6 p. m. on 5 days a week, and from 7 a. m.

until 7 p. m. on Saturday. The contract calls for the same hours with the exception of Saturday, when it is asked to make the working day from 8 a. m. until 7 p. m.

Butchers at the local packing house reached an agreement and signed a contract with their employers several months ago.

TITLE CONTEST SET FOR TONIGHT

The Papermakers and the Eagles of the Sundown league will play the deciding game of the three-game series this evening when they meet on the Oxford park diamond. Both teams have won one game and the game tonight, weather permitting, ought to be a royal battle. The Papermakers are given the edge over the Eagles although another surprise might arise.

The Eagles also have a strong team but have been handicapped by the loss of several of their regulars and are forced to use substitutes. The game tonight will be played on the Oxford park diamond beginning at 6:15.

15 YEAR SEARCH FOR PARENTS OF WOMAN IS ENDED

Quincy, Ill., July 22.—(A. P.)—A 15 year search for her parents was ended Tuesday when Mrs. Clarence McNeill of Denver, Col., arrived here and embraced Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Heck of this city.

Mrs. McNeill said that when she was a girl of nine and living in Pendleton, Or., among her neighbors was a childless couple named Gardner, who became very much attached to her. They induced her parents to allow her to remain with them for a time, after which the Hecks took her back home. The Gardner, she said, offered her parents inducements to allow them legally to adopt the child, but they refused.

Mrs. McNeill said that the Gardner then moved to Portland, and in a short time a strange man came for her and took her to the Gardner. It was the last she saw of her parents until she met them here today. The Gardner treated her as their own daughter and sent her to a private school, at all times endeavoring to impress upon her that she was all a daughter could be to them and asking her to forget her parents.

Some years ago the Gardner died within a short time of each other and Mrs. McNeill began the search for her parents. A short time ago she learned from a distant relative, there was a family by the name of Heck living in Quincy and she wrote to this city. Facts contained in the reply left no doubt in her mind that she had at last found her parents. Yesterday she came here and the identification was completed.

STAYTON-MEHAMA ROAD PAVING THIRD FINISHED

Mt. Hood City, July 22.—About one third of the new paving being put down between Mehama and Stayton has been completed. A detour has been provided by the county from Stayton to Mehama via the Fern Ridge route, but enterprising farmers along the line have opened up a passage through their fields and are charging cars 25 cents and trucks 50 cents for going through, it being impossible to go along side the new paving on account of the road being so narrow.

Los Angeles, Cal., July 22.—(A. P.)—The Los Angeles Evening Express today announced a change of ownership whereby Edward A. Dickson, its editor, and Guy C. Earl Jr., become the new proprietors.

Kellom, former publisher of the San Francisco Call and Post, who with Mr. Dickson purchased the paper four years ago, returns and takes over full control of a chain of afternoon daily papers to adjoining cities and towns, 14 in number, in which Messrs. Dickson and Earl previously had been associated with him. These all are members of the Associated Press.
