

### STATE BUILDING PROGRAM TOTALS NEARLY MILLION

The state building program for the two years, 1925 and 1926, will involve a total expenditure of \$15,738, according to a statement by Sam A. Koser, secretary of state.

The biggest projects, which are now in progress of construction, are an addition to the Eastern Oregon hospital for the insane at Pendleton, which will cost \$225,000, and the new cottage system training school for boys at Woodburn, which will cost about \$243,000.

A new dormitory at the state institution for the feeble-minded will cost \$50,000, which is \$25,450 less than the legislature appropriated for the purpose. For a new pavilion at the state tuberculosis hospital the legislature appropriated \$53,501, while the contract entered into by the board calls for \$30,000. A cottage will be erected for the W. C. T. U. children's home near Corvallis, and the board of control and the trustees of the home have let a contract at \$15,000.

Appropriations were made by the legislature and plans are being prepared by the board of normal school regents for a new normal school at Ashland, to cost \$175,000, and a training school building at Independence for the month normal school, to cost \$125,000. Contracts for the former will be let in about 60 days and the latter in about 30 days. Plans are being prepared for the construction of a school building for the children's farm home of the W. C. T. U. near Corvallis, for which the legislature appropriated \$35,000, the contract to be let within 60 days, and for an institution hospital for the Louise Home for girls near Portland, to cost \$17,500. The Pacific Rescue society is preparing the plans.

### STREET PAVING BEING RUSHED

Silverton, July 24—Work preparatory to paving was begun this week on that part of West Main street which is at present unpaved. The contract was awarded some time ago to Harrison and Wilson and it is expected that the pavement which is to be of concrete will be ready for use within a few weeks.

The improving of the street up West Hill or Liberty Hill, as it is also called, will take that all of the principal streets leading into Silverton are paved. Improvement of the hill has long been urged as most of the traffic into town from South Silverton and the Waldgo hills was over this hill. Always rough and with a curve near the bottom the street was particularly bad to drive over. Complete relief from the roughness of the street will not be afforded, however, as there will still remain unpaved the portion beyond Eureka avenue out to the city limits where the county pavement begins.

### ROSENBERG IS STILL CHAMPION

New York, July 24—(AP)—Eight of American pugilism's nine championships remain in the east today after a stout hearted, strong armed defense of the heavyweight title by Charley (Phil) Rosenberg against a vain but furious challenger from Chicago. Rosenberg sits on his throne alongside Genaro, Kaplan, Ballerino, Goodrich, Walker, Greb and Berlenbach, but only because he was able to knock out the hard hitting Eddie Shea after nine minutes and 29 seconds of terrific

fighting, wading through a maelstrom of haymakers, the champion put down Shea after lifting himself by a mighty effort from the brink of defeat.

In the first two rounds Shea drove the champion all over the ring. Then Rosenberg met the challenger in the center of the arena and slugged with him toe to toe, until a terrific right floored the Chicago boy. Shea, took a count of two and sprang up, only to measure his length on the canvas again from a right for a count of three.

Exchanges in the fourth ended in another crushing Rosenberg right. This time the game Chicagoan went down for nine. He was too groggy to defend himself when he arose and the champion finished his man.

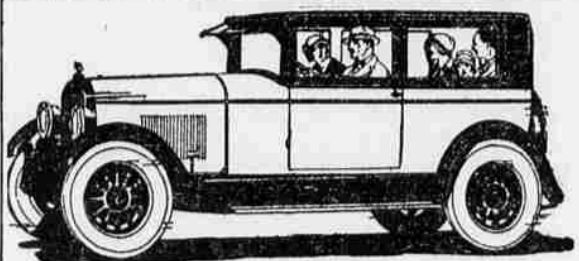
