### STAGE DELIVERY OF MAIL DENIED

Stayton, Or., July 25.—The United States postal department has refused the petitions of Stayton, Sublimity, Beahama and Mill City that their respective mails be sent by stage instead of by train.

Under the present system the mail is dispatched on the Woodburn branch of the Southern Pacific and the towns on the route receive two mails in the morning but have no afternoon mail.
