SHY FILBERT CROP
PROMISED IN SICILY

WALNUT YIELD
IN CALIFORNIA
BREAKS RECORD

Portland, July 25—The curb but-
ter market maintained its recent
firmness with a good local demand
and light offerings.

The 1925 filbert crop of Sicily,
grown principally in the provinces
of Messina and Palermo, will be
from 30 to 40 per cent below aver-
age, according to W. Hoderich
Dorey, American consul at Palermo.

The California Walnut Growers
association, in its first estimate of
merchandise walnut production
in California for the season of
1925, which is put out under date
of July 7, estimates the total pro-
duction for the state this year at
29,250 tons, says the California
Fruit News.

Portland, July 25—The curb but-
ter market maintained its recent
firmness with a good local demand
and light offerings.

Contracts for octon delivery
made in June were closed at prices
as high as 12.2 cents per pound,
owing to the poor outlook and the
virtual exhaustion of stocks. Sales
for the week, 1924, ranged around
11.3 cents and in October, 1923,
around 4.4 cents. Strong competi-
tion from Asia Minor is viewed as
the only possibility for reducing
prices this season.

This is the largest production
we have had in California, the
nearest approach to it having been
the crop of 1913, with 28,100 tons.
In this estimate the walnut associa-
tion puts southern California
down at 26,580 tons and the walnut
production in California north of
San Francisco at 2,670 tons. Segregated
by counties, the figures are as
follows:

Between 1600 and 1800 cars of
