Dallas, July 25.—The first great adventure of two Medford lads, Carl Pittz and Glen Stringer, aged about 14 years terminated Saturday night in Dallas when they were picked up and held by Marshal Chase pending advice from Medford. The lads had run away to see the world and were headed for Portland. They were about ready to sing "Home, Sweet Home," however, for they were broke, side tracked and hungry. The boys made it all right as far as Salem by freight, but they caught a train out of that place which landed them in Dallas instead of Portland as they had hoped. A telegram from Medford indicated that someone will be after them soon.

Divorce Suit Filed A divorce suit was filed Monday in circuit court by Ruby L. Muhleman against Samuel Muhleman, seeking an absolute divorce, custody of an infant child and \$75 per month alimony, for support of herself and child. Mrs. Muhleman alleges personal indignities, failure to support, the publication of notices that he would not be responsible for debts contracted by her, and other grounds for divorce. The couple were married March 8, 1921, at Monmouth. They have a daughter nine months old. Mrs. Muhleman is represented by Fletcher & Ellis of Independence.

BENTSON FUNERAL TO BE HELD WEDNESDAY

Silverton, Or., July 28.—(Special)—Funeral services will be held at the Trinity church, Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, Rev. George Hendriksen officiating, for Charles Bentson, who died in Montana, Saturday morning, after a prolonged illness. Mr. Bentson was living in Shelby at the time of his death, having moved there from Lathair only a few weeks ago. Prior to their going to Montana about ten years ago the family lived in Silverton. Beside his wife and three children he is survived by his mother, Mrs. Olivia Bentson; a sister, Mrs. Nels Langvay, and seven brothers. Charles Bentson was the third member of the family to die, his father and a brother, Sam, having passed a few years ago. At the time of his death Mr. Bentson was 38 years and one month old. Interment will be in the Lutheran cemetery east of Silverton, where his father and brother are buried.

STAYTON SERVICE STATION ROBBED OF 20 TIRES

Stayton, Or., July 28.—The Yeoman service station at Stayton was robbed Saturday night or early Sunday morning. About \$15 in cash and approximately 20 new tires were taken from the place. The burglar gained entrance by jamming a window. However, the front door was found open Sunday morning but the thief had apparently opened it from the inside so that his loot might be more easily removed. The theft was discovered Sunday morning by Alva Davis, an employe, when he attempted to unlock the station. No traces were left by the burglar, but it is thought that it was the work of one person. Officials are at a loss for clues as to the identity of the thief.

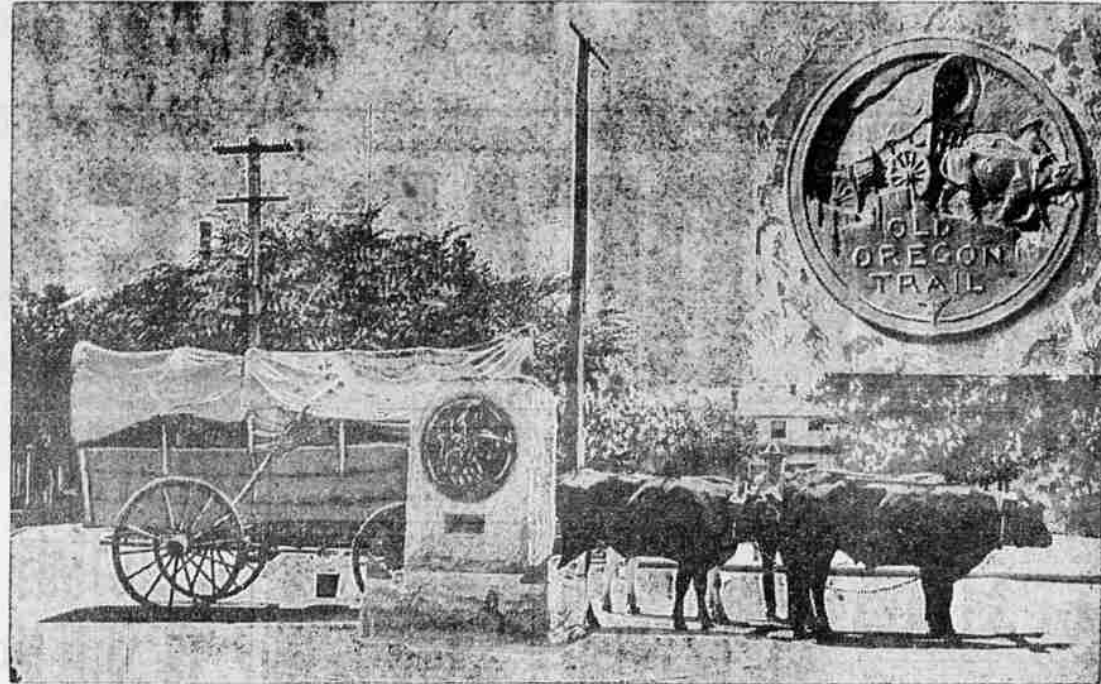
NEW WELCOME SIGN TO BE ERECTED, FALLS CITY
